

SHOOTING COURT SERPENT WEALTHY

German Institution Scene of Bloody Affrays—Defendant Draws Revolver to Shoot Adverse Witnesses.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—The slaying of Captain von Westphalen by Professor Hirsch, the painter, during court proceedings on September 18th, has now been followed by two more shooting affairs in a court room, one of these also before a court of honor. No one was injured in the latter case, but in the other referred to, two persons were wounded and the shooter killed himself.

Dr. Arndt, of Paderborn had been engaged by a brother physician to represent him during his vacation. At the last minute, Arndt demanded more money for his services than had been agreed upon, and the other doctor had to accede. During his absence, Arndt severely criticized his absent colleague before the latter's patients, and advised one to sue the absent physician for malpractice. Arndt was called before a court of honor by his profession, a peculiarity German institutions and fined \$75 for false and unprofessional conduct. He thereupon drew a revolver and opened fire. The presiding judge ducked beneath his desk, an example followed by every one else in the room. Arndt's six shots went wild. He was overpowered and an investigation into his sanity will be made.

The other courtroom shooting took place during a suit of trifling importance at Hamburg. The defendant, a hotel keeper, opened fire from a revolver without warning, severely wounding two adverse witnesses and then blew out his own brains.

DIFFERENCE IN CHESS

German Declared Game Commercialized by American Influences—Some Historic Matches Told of.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—Chess editors in Germany declare that the game of chess has been commercialized under American influences and they claim a striking illustration of this in the match for the championship of the world that has just been arranged between Dr. Emanuel Lasker, who lived some years in New York, and Akiba Rubinstein, the foremost player of Russia.

According to the financial plans for the match it is expected that the two players will divide nearly \$10,000 between them. Dr. Lasker is now corresponding with some of the principal German chess clubs, three games played in the rooms of any club that will contribute about \$1,500 in return for this honor.

German writers contrast the Lasker-Rubinstein match with the one played at Paris in 1858 between Paul Morphy and Adolf Anderssen, the German champion of that day. Anderssen, who was professor in a preparatory school at Breslau, was willing to rush to Paris during his brief Christmas holidays to play eleven games with Morphy, although there was no money staked on either side. On the other hand, Lasker and Rubinstein will have nearly a year to prepare for their great struggle, and it will last for three months.

CHINESE PARLIAMENT CANNOT FORM QUORUM

Peking, Nov. 7.—As neither house of the Chinese parliament is able to form a quorum the leaders of the other parties are endeavoring to persuade the government to return their credentials to the less hostile members of the Democratic party, all of whom, about 200, had been expelled from parliament by presidential proclamation. The party was formerly led by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the first provincial president of China, now in exile.

The speaker of the assembly, Tang Hui Lung, has requested the remaining members of parliament to stay in Peking and strive for the maintenance of the parliamentary institutions, as he states that the termination of these will mean the ending of the Chinese republic.
