Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 26—Special—Upon railway construction in Canada a constant check is kept by the government, by reason of the subsidies paid out and reports received here point to remarkably satisfactory proses in construction during the season now closing. Sixty per cent, of the Montreal-Port Arthur section of the Canadian Northern has been completed, while on the British Columbia section, construction is nearly done.



Montreal, Nov. 26.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy is quoted in an interview as giving the following opinion on the outlook in Canada:

"The pause in the flow of money into Canada has been beneficial in that it has enforced on Canadians that careful and economical handling of money in business and in private affairs which has been the real secret of Canada's past prosperity.

"Ther-flow of immigration into Canada cannot cease, for it is due to economic conditions which show no signs of changing.
