THE EMPEROR OF JAPAN.

Yoshihito, Emperor of Japan and 122nd head of the Japanese imperial house after the first Emperor, Jimmu, whose reign began 2,575 years ago, has left Tokio for Kloto to make his state entry into the capital of his forefathers and there formally accede to the throne of the Empire of the Rising Sun. The Monarch was to have been accompanied by Empress Sadako, but the nearness of the period when she is expected to give birth to another heir prevents her from participating in the ceremonies. The whole city of Tokio is in joyous festa unexampled in Japanese history since the triumphant entry of Emperor Mutsuhito nearly fifty years ago. Hundreds of thousands of people are there from the provinces, most of them to remain until the great celebration in Tokio at the end of the month, when the Emperor returns to Kloto.
