Will Be Interned.
Herman Tulkanos and William Warren, the two young Germans who were taken in custody on Monday night by Detectives Barrett and Briggs from the United States tug boat Ramona, were yesterday examined by the authorities at police headquarters. It was found that the men were born in Germany, and an order was given that they be interned at Amherst. An escort will leave for Amherst today with the men.

Liquor Seized.
Inspector J. B. Jones made a seizure of 5 cases of whiskey yesterday at the I. C. R. freight shed under the section of the act which provides that all packages of liquor going into a Scott Act county must have a tag bearing the name of the shipper, the consignor and also the fact that it contained intoxicating liquor. These packages were not so marked hence the seizure. As the name of the shipper is unknown it is not likely any further steps will be taken in the matter. The seized liquor has been placed in a bonded warehouse on Nelson street.

MONDAY TO BE ELECTION DAY FOR COUNCIL

Commissioner McLellan introduces bill in interest of Commercial Travellers

Visions of the spring civic elections floated before the eyes of the members of the city council yesterday when Commissioner McLellan submitted a bill for presentation to the Legislature amending the election act by changing the day for filling nominations for the civic elections and the swearing in of the new members from Tuesdays to Mondays. Commissioner Russell seconded a motion approving of the bill, and it was unanimously endorsed.

Commissioner McLellan in explaining the reasons why the changes were desirable pointed out that there were from 400 to 500 commercial travellers resident in the city, and many of them spend Sundays at home. A large number, he said, must leave the city on Mondays and are therefore deprived of their votes on election day, Tuesday. He further said that these men should not be deprived of their votes. They are the best barometers of the business feeling throughout New Brunswick, and constitute an important element in the community.

Mayor Frink remarked that the inability of many of these men to vote had been a cause for complaint. It is proposed to have the bill become effective at the next election.

There is little new in the mayoralty situation. Judge J. G. Forbes has said that he would consent to be a candidate. Former Mayor T. H. Bull is said to be a possible candidate, but neither he nor Mayor Frink have as yet issued any definite official statement. Mayor Frink's friends are anxious for him to be a candidate again, and they hope that he will make an announcement to that effect within a short time.

There was a large gathering last night in the Orange Hall, German street, when the feature was the unveiling of the roll of honor of Marlborough Lodge, Sons of England. Short speeches were given by Mayor Frink, A. M. Belding, Postmaster Sears and William Hawker.

The president of the lodge, E. A. Lawrenson, welcomed the visitors in a few appropriate words. Then followed a programme of music, recitations and speeches as follows: Sons of England, "O Canada," with chorus by the audience; pianoforte selections Mr. Jones; recitation, Walter Spencer; speech by Mr. Belding; presentation of honor roll by Charles Ledford and T. H. Carter; photograph selections by Mr. House of the Edison Company; song, F. J. Punter; speech by Edward Sears and William Hawker; selections, W. Shepherd; song, The Maple Leaf Forever, Miss Spencer; solo, Master Nixon, boy scout; photograph selections; recitation, Miss Titus; speech by the Mayor; duet, Sergeant Brown and Corporal Griffin; God Save the King.

We continue to fight on land, but let our thoughts go to the men on the sea, the men who ever watchful stand by their guns on board ship and are ever ready for any emergency."

The proceedings were in every way pleasing, and great enthusiasm was shown by both members of Marlborough Lodge and the visitors. Towards the close refreshments were served.
