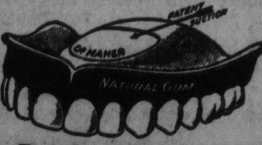

COUNCIL DIVIDES ON PLAN OF TAX EXEMPTION FOR THE SAKER SHIPBUILDING PLANT

**Agreement Finally Adopted by Which Mr. Saker
Will Pay Rate of \$200 for First Year and \$1,000
for Remaining Nineteen Years—New Financial
Arrangement Between City and Bank of Nova
Scotia—Fuel Situation Discussed.**

At the meeting of the common council held yesterday the agreement between the city and D. A. Saker for certain tax exemptions was passed with Commissioners McLellan and Fisher dissenting because the amount to be expended in 1918 was reduced from \$100,000 to \$80,000 and no provision was made for a minimum output. It was decided to make a financial arrangement with the Bank of Nova Scotia for a period of three years. Several matters of routine were disposed of.

Mayor Hayes presided and Commissioners Wigmore, McLellan, Russell and Fisher were present.

On recommendation of the commissioner of finance and public affairs the comptroller was authorized to pass payment accounts coming to him properly certified not later than July 15th. On recommendation of the commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands the comptroller was authorized to pass for payment the account of J. S. Eagles & Co. of \$708.18 for birch timber for repairs on the new pier and the South Rodney wharf.

A renewal lease was issued to Hugh McGill, administrator of the estate of Charles McGill, of lot No. 591, Brucedale ward, for seven years from 1st November, 1915, at \$13.20 per annum, an increase of ten per cent. on the original rental.

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and lands was authorized to sell by auction the two city properties at Fairville known respectively as the "Duncan" and "Red" properties.

Queen's Rink Remodeling.

Building Inspector Carleton wrote in connection with the request for a permit to alter alterations in Queen's Rink to fit it for a theatre, asking for instruction in the matter, as he claimed that the building, being in fire district No. 1, he had not the power to issue the permit.

Commissioner McLellan explained that the building inspector had no jurisdiction as to what the building was to be used for. The permit for permission to use it for a theatre had to come from the mayor and the building inspector could issue his permit to make the repairs. On motion the communication was received.

Library Commissioners.

Mrs. James F. Robertson and Richard O'Brien were appointed to succeed themselves as commissioners of the Free Public Library.

New Agreement With Bank.

Mayor Hayes reported that the financial arrangement between the city and the Bank of Nova Scotia had expired. He had taken the matter up with several of the other banks but none of them seemed to want the business. The Bank of Nova Scotia had offered to make a new agreement for three years. They would pay the city four per cent. on credit balances and charge 5 1/2 per cent. on overdrafts and permit overdraft up to \$400,000, and he recommended that their offer be accepted. This was adopted.

Tax Exemption Agreement.
The agreement prepared by the city solicitor and W. A. Ewing, K. C., representing D. A. Saker, was read. They recommended a rate of \$200 for the year 1918 and for the following nine years.

CHANCERY DIVISION.

The monthly sitting of the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, was held yesterday morning. Mr. Justice Grimmer presiding.

In the case of Calaghan et al. vs. Sullivan et al. Hon. W. P. Jones moved for judgment for want of appearance. An order was made for sale and partition. The property is in Carleton county.

In the case of Broderick et al. executors of D. O'Connell, vs. Dunn, S. A. M. Skinner moved for foreclosure and sale of property in Simonds. The order was made. The amount was assessed at \$237.40.

In the case of Kennedy et al. vs. Chittick, J. H. McFadden moved for foreclosure and sale of property in Kings county. The order was made accordingly. The amount due was assessed at \$237.50.

In the case of Barge vs. Ross, on motion of Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., a decree was varied.

In Murray vs. Hagerton, G. H. V. Belyea moved for final decree of redemption. The order was made, and the damages assessed at \$239.61.

The cases of Garnet vs. Garnet, and the Maritime Mail Company, Limited vs. Jas. Gregory were stood over until next court.
