MYSTERY IN DEATH OF SPRING-RICE?

Member of House of Commons Brings Up Subject and Asks Peculiar Question.

London, Feb. 20.—In the House of Commons Noel Pemberton-Billing asked whether, in view of the fact that the late Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador at Washington, was instrumental in the Calcutta-Bombay disclosures, an inquiry would be held to determine if his death was due to any cause other than that announced.

The Speaker replied that Mr. Billing was required to put his question in writing and that it would be answered in the regular order.

SPRING-RICE DIED OF HEART FAILURE

Ate Heavy Dinner After an Afternoon of Strenuous Skiing.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The suggestion of Mr. Noel Pemberton Billing in the British House of Commons last night that there should be an inquiry into the death of Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, who died suddenly at Rideau Hall on the night of Wednesday last, is not regarded seriously here. Dr. Thomas Gibson, who was called to the late statesman's bedside shortly after death, said today that death was due to natural causes, the result of heart failure brought on by a heavy dinner eaten by the former ambassador after an afternoon of strenuous skiing.

MUCH BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT COUNCIL MEETING

Counsel Engaged to Appear for City—Order to Increase Gas Rates Rescinded—Report from Chairman of Assessors.

At the meeting of the Common Council held yesterday morning it was decided to engage counsel to appear on behalf of the city at the next hearing of the application of the N.B. Telephone Co. for permission to change the hours of which the night rate shall apply; a resolution passed calling on the Public Utilities Commission to rescind the order giving the N. B. Power Co. authority to increase the gas rates; the tender for asphalt was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works; a report was received from the chairman of the Board of Assessors re the C.P.R. valuation for patriotic purposes and several matters of routine business were disposed of.

Mayor Hayes presided and Commissioners Russell McLellan and Fisher attended. Mayor Hayes announced that Mr. MacIntyre had returned to the city and was ready to give the commissioners all the information he could in regard to his report on the N. B. Power Co. books. It was decided to hold a special meeting at three o'clock in the afternoon to hear Mr. MacIntyre. Commissioner Russell moved that a renewal lease be issued to Frederick Knapp at Lot No. 8, Block D, Lancaster for seven years from May 1, 1918, at a rental of \$13.75 per annum an increase of 10 p.c.; that Lot No. 817, corner Rodney street and Market Place be leased to George A. Clark. Adopted.

A communication from the Trades and Labor Council requesting the council to hasten action by the Assessment Commission so that a report should be ready for the coming session of the legislature was referred to the mayor. E. M. Olive, chairman of the Board of Assessors, reported that Messrs. Mackenzie and Mackenzie had made an appraisal of the physical value of the C.P.R. property in the city and valued at \$14,210,595, as against the city valuation of \$6,100,000. The St. John Railway and Bridge Co. property they valued at \$330,985 while the city valuation was \$400,000. The report was referred to the Commissioner of Finance.

Tenders for asphalt were opened and referred to the Commissioner of Public Works, as follows: Barrett Co., Water street, Trinidad asphalt, \$39.75 per ton of 2,000 pounds, 1,000 gallons flux oil, 24 cents per imperial gallon; J. T. Knapp and Co., oil asphalt, \$37 per ton of 2,000 pounds, 1,000 gallons flux oil, 18 cents per imperial gallon. A communication was read from William Thomson and Co. complaining of having a lost receipt for No. 4 shed and asking that it be repaired. Referred to the harbor commissioner.

The council, on motion, adopted the following resolution prepared and submitted by Commissioner Fisher: "That legislation be sought to revoke the permission granted to the St. John R. Co. by the Board of Works of the city on 12th July, 1907, to double track the bldg on Union street from the head of Brasenale to Sydney street."

On motion of Commissioner Fisher the N. B. Telephone Co. was granted permission to erect a pole on Leinster street near Pitt. Commissioner Fisher brought up the advisability of the city being represented by counsel at the next hearing of the N. B. Telephone Co. and moved that as the city solicitor was not available immediate steps be taken to secure counsel.

This was seconded by Commissioner McLellan and passed. Commissioner Fisher stated it was his high time consideration be given to the question of the office of the city solicitor. He accordingly moved the following resolution:

"That in lieu of the present method of having a city solicitor the city employ only a portion of his time to city matters and is not always available, a solicitor be engaged who will have no other clients and will give all his time to the city."

No action was taken. Commissioner Fisher said he had received by telephone an objection to Dr. Wallace as associate counsel with Dr. Baxter in the N. B. Power Co. matter, as it was claimed he was personal counsel for one close to the Power Company. Later in the day the commissioner stated that he had learned there was nothing in the report.

A motion by Commissioner Fisher that the Utilities Commission be asked to rescind the order allowing the N.B. Power Co. to increase the price of gas passed. Commissioner McLellan was authorized to call for tenders for 400 yards of cloth for uniforms. Permission was received from the Minister of Finance for the issuance of debentures to the amount of \$534,500 by the city and referred to the mayor.

A request from the residents of Millidgeville for the appointment of a poundkeeper was referred to the Commissioner of Safety. Mayor Hayes asked about "Silent Policemen." Commissioner McLellan doubted whether they would be any improvement on the present system as the traffic policemen safeguard pedestrians while the "Silent Policemen" only pointed out the way traffic should go.

In answer to Commissioner Fisher the Commissioner of Safety said the electrical inspector would work under code of the Chicago Board of Underwriters and in addition to inspecting wiring would have to have some knowledge of dynamo-electric machinery.

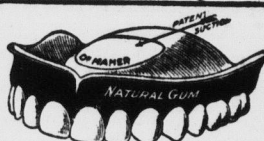

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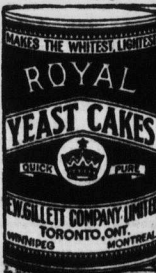
