Belmont's Tracery Sold For \$179,670

One of the Largest Sums Ever Paid for a Horse and Low Exchange Rate Keeps Price from Reaching World's Record.

London, Feb. 28.—August Belmont, of New York, has sold Tracery for \$253,000, or \$179,670. This is one of the largest prices ever paid for a horse, and if the rate of exchange were normal it would be a world's record price. Senor S. J. Uzuu, of Buenos Aires, bought the noted stallion through a broker. He will be shipped to South America this spring. He is now standing at South Court Stud Farm.
