knew about being a witness in this  
case about two weeks ago. His son  
returned from the west three weeks  
ago last Saturday. Edward Bruce  
went away on the same night as Yull  
did. Witness mentioned the names of  
a number of other young men who  
were talking to his son the night he  
went west. Witness did not know  
who the conductor of the train was  
that night. He knows Archie Paris  
but did not see him at the train that  
night. He knew John Paris first as  
"Jack the Witch," thirteen or fourteen  
years ago. His son bought a ticket to  
St. John that time and paid something  
over \$4 for it. He saw Paris about  
two minutes after the son bought his  
ticket. Paris was walking up the  
platform at the time and was alone.  
He also saw Paris fifteen minutes  
later. He would not swear that Paris  
went on the train. Witness was in-  
formed by his son that he would be a  
witness, and Mr. Vernon sent for him  
Monday of last week. He did not tell  
Mr. Vernon that his son went away  
on the harvest excursion train. Wit-  
ness knew that Paris claimed that he  
went away on Aug. 3.
