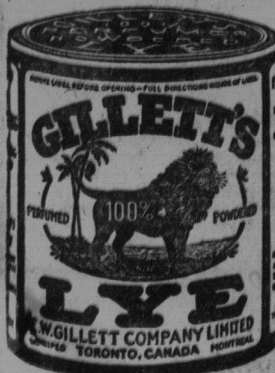
James A. Campbell.

\$9,000 In Cash Disappeared From Mail Pouch

Lost When Sack Containing
Registered Parcel Was Missed
After Train Derailment.

North Bay, Ont., Nov. 28.—Nine thousand dollars in cash was the amount lost on November 14 last when a mail sack containing a registered parcel, the property of the Imperial Bank of Canada, disappeared from the mail enroute to Toronto.

This was the statement made over the long distance telephone this morning by D. Sutherland, manager of the Timmins branch of the Imperial Bank. The parcel containing the bank notes had been mailed at Timmins on November 14 and has been traced, according to Mr. Sutherland, as far as Porcupine Junction. It was at Kruger Junction, 117 miles south of Porcupine Junction, that the derailment of the Continental Limited occurred on the night of November 14. Each side of the T and N. O. tracks between Kruger Junction and Porcupine Junction has been thoroughly combed by officials of the postal service and secret service agents who are working on the case, but the strictest silence is being observed.

MORE EVIDENCE FOR THE DEFENCE HEARD IN McAULEY MURDER TRIAL

Stanley Nichols, Gordon Hayman and Miss Mackenzie of
Truro Testify Regarding John Paris Being in Truro on
August 2.

The trial of John Paris for the murder of Sadie McAuley was resumed at 2.30 yesterday afternoon after the week-end recess. The petit jury was called, and those who were not included in the Paris jury were dismissed till Wednesday afternoon at 2.30.

Stanley Nichols, the Truro garage man who had been on the stand all Saturday afternoon and part of Sunday morning, was recalled by Mr. Byrnes continued his cross-examination.

Nichols swore that the entry of the 5th of August had never been changed from anything to a five. It had never been a four. He was given the book and told to stand before the jury with it, there he was given a magnifying glass, but after looking at the entry still maintained it was a four.

The jurors were given the book and glass and one of them remarked that "it looks like part of a four." Resuming his seat Nichols said he could not see a four, but if there was a change it must have been made by him.

Asked if he was sure the purchase was made on the 5th, he produced the oil company's receipt dated August 5. He stated it was given to him on that day by Robinson, the company's tank man. So far as he knew the company had no office in Truro when Robinson was there, he supposed Robinson sent his returns.

He said Robinson was the first man he had ever told of buying gas from Paris. The reason he did so was because Robinson saw the can in the garage and said it was a company can and asked him where he got it. Nichols said he did not know it. He said he did not know it. He did not give McNight any instructions of how it was to be sent. He had known Paris to see when they were both kids. He did not know if Paris had any brothers. From that he did not remember having any dealings with Paris before the 2nd of August.

He did not remember if he had sworn Saturday that at the preliminary hearing in Truro he bought the gas on the 2nd or 3rd of August. He did not know when he looked at his book and found he bought the gas from Paris on the 2nd, or who he first told of it.

Sometime after the trial in Truro Mr. Vernon, who defended Paris, asked him the date. This was before the trial in St. John.

Nichols said if he was sure the gasoline Paris bought was stolen he would not have bought it. It only cost him about five cents more, and Paris told him where it came from.

He said Paris before he made the entry. He knew there was between 4.12 and 5 gallons, and started to put 4.12 or 4.34, and then thought it was nearer 5.

Witness said he was a returned man. He did not know if Robinson was or not. Robinson was not a native of Truro.

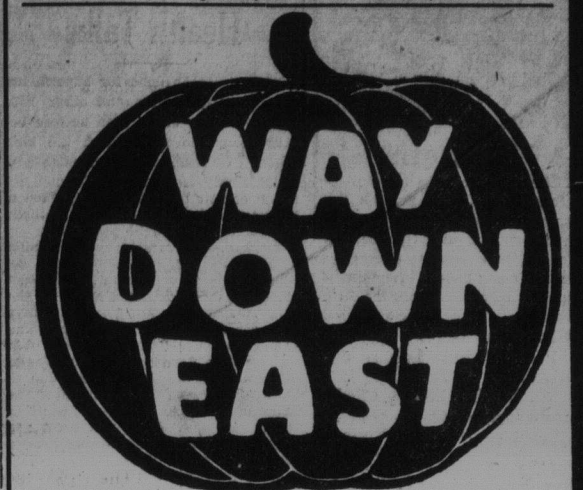
This concluded Mr. Byrnes' cross-examination.

on. Witness did not know if any excursion train left on Aug. 4. He first knew about being a witness in this case about two weeks ago. His son returned from the west three weeks ago last Saturday. Edward Bruce went away on the same night as Yuill did. Witness mentioned the names of a number of other young men who were talking to his son the night he went west. Witness did not know who the conductor of the train was that night. He knows Archie Paris but did not see him at the train that night. He knew John Paris first as "Jack the Witch," thirteen or fourteen years ago. His son bought a ticket to St. John that time and paid something over \$4 for it. He saw Paris about two minutes after the son bought his ticket. Paris was walking up the platform at the time and was alone. He also saw Paris fifteen minutes later. He would not swear that Paris went on the train. Witness was informed by his son that he would be a witness, and Mr. Vernon sent for him Monday of last week. He did not tell Mr. Vernon that his son went away on the harvest excursion train. Witness knew that Paris claimed that he went away on Aug. 3.

Mr. Vernon knew that the son went west. Witness did not know how Paris was dressed on the night of the third. Paris was clean shaven on the night in question and the first time he had ever seen Paris wearing a moustache was in court.

Miss Christina MacKenzie
Miss Christina MacKenzie, book keeper of the Eastern Hat and Cap Company, was recalled. The books were produced and examined by the judge. Witness said that the writing was made by her. The book was a completed order binder.

Mr. Vernon offered receipts in evidence. A magnifying glass was used by the prosecution in the examination of the books. In Miss MacKenzie's writing a slight alteration or erasure had been made. The record was then examined by the jury. In turn, Miss MacKenzie said that she could not remember the last time she saw the entry before coming to St. John. The entry was made on August 2nd. She remembered watching the Chautauque parade on that morning about ten o'clock. She also remembered at the time of a man coming to the window and she started to write "Cash Given" and then changed it to "Cash Paid." This was from her memory without looking at the book.

Mr. Byrnes thought that the entry should not be used as evidence. His Honor thought the jury should see it, but he would not allow it as evidence. Continuing Miss MacKenzie said that it was her duty to balance the cash
