

# TALLY BURNED TRYING TO SAVE HER MOTHER

Malax, Oct. 15.—The sister of Dr. John V. Rowe, head of the medical department in the insane asylum of Ward's Island, New York, was so badly burned while trying to save her aged mother from a similar fate that she died.

the accident occurred at her home in Williams (N. S.), a day or two after Rowe's arrival here on his annual visit to his mother. Mrs. Rowe, who is a lady of eighty years, was in the kitchen when the clothing took fire, ignited by a spark from the stove. The daughter ran to her

the stove. The daughter ran to her mother's help, throwing a piece of carpet and her form. In doing this the young man's own clothing took fire. She rushed out screaming and plunged into a tub of water near the door. She was taken out with her clothing literally flaming off her body, and after terrible suffering for several days she died yesterday.

The mother was not so badly burned cannot long survive. Dr. Rowe had come to Nova Scotia a few days before, was in a different part of the province visiting another sister. He was hastily sent and was with his sister before she died, and is now ministering to his aged mother. While Dr. Rowe was here two years ago his father died.
