RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT WILL NEVER AGAIN MANUFACTURE ALCOHOLIC DRINKS.

Petrograd, Oct. 20.—The Russian Union of Abstinence, which devotes itself to the combating of alcoholism, addressed to Emperor Nucholas a solicitation that he forbid forever the sale of spirituous liquors in Russia. His Majesty replied in a telegram sent in the name of the Grand Duke Constantine and addressed to the President of the Alliance in which he said: "I thank you; I long decided to interdict for all time in Russia the sale of alcoholic drinks by the Government."

SALE OF ALCOHOL IS FOREVER FORBIDDEN IN RUSSIA.

Paris, Oct. 20.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Havas agency says that the Russian press is cuthusiastic over the declaration by the Russian Emperol that the sale of alcohol by the government is forever forbidden in Russia. Novoe Vremya cites as a happy effect of the suppression of the sale of liquor, an increase in savings bank deposits during September of \$11,500,000 over the same month last year, in spite of the war.
