Wood).

Moving into the outfield you could put heavy hitting Len Curry (IGA) or Al Mugford (Knob Hill) into left; Hal Kemp (IGA) or Wayne Gordaneer (Cedar Grove) in centre and Junior Anderson (ANAF) or Brian Ferry (IGA) in right.

Of course, there are other just as fine ball players. Brent Anderson, Mel Steinberg of Knob Hill, Cliff Miller, Bob Hamilton of G. H. Wood, etc.

There'd be no problem with pitching. Chaps like Jack Rainbow, Marty Baller, Ab Deasley, Matt Stefanic, Don Crawley. Keith Lancaster, Jim Clarke, etc., they're sharp and all have good assortment of curves, drops, rise balls and change-ups.

The league is interested in sponsoring junior fastball next year. Which is progress for sure. Make your inquiries from any executive member.

Get out to see these teams play. It's not bush league stuff, it's top notch fastball. The fresh air is great. So is the action.
