

- June 16 Telegram and letter, Greene to King, in acknowledgment of letter from K. (Copy not kept by K., though probably in files of Mr. Greene), expressing willingness to come to New York for interim conference at week-end, and stating that Mr. Greene would have to be away himself at Mt. Desert, but that Mr. Rockefeller would be glad to see Mr. King at his residence on Sunday.
- June 17 Telegram, King to Greene (copy not kept) promising to be in New York Sunday.
- June 18 Letter from Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Jr. to King, to await arrival at Harvard Club, setting out proposed arrangements for day.
- June 21 (Sunday) Conversation between Mr. Murphy and King between New York and Tarrytown; conversation, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Mr. Murphy and King at residence of Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Sr. at Tarrytown. Informal discussion as to nature and scope of the Investigation into Industrial Relations to be undertaken by Foundation and probable course to be adopted for undertaking. Mention of possibility of spending coming winter and next spring in England and Europe. Discussion of effect of Oriental competition upon maintenance of standard of American labor and necessity, in interest of American labor, of preventing industrial strife and avoiding handicaps from this source. Mr. King asked if, in the event of undertaking studies, he would like commission or board to report to. In reply he said he would prefer to accept the whole responsibility and not have a board. Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Sr. expressed approval of this point of view. The question of salary and possible assistance required also discussed. Also provisions of Canadian legislation re combines, trusts, etc. The Colorado situation scarcely touched upon.
