In explanation of his own position Mr. Graham said he had voted and acted as he did with the knowledge and approval of his leader, and he would take the same course again if he had to. The points in regard to which there was complete unanimity were summarized, and Mr. Graham then announced there would be another meeting later on when all the candidates were in the field.
