Cheese Board.

At the regular meeting of the Napanee Cheese Board, held in the Agricultural Rooms on Saturday afternoon, 604 white and 169 colored cheese were boarded. The colored cheese sold for 10c. and 201 white cheese sold for 9½¢, the balance being refused. The prices indicated a slight increase over last week. The Napanee Cheese Factory ceased operations for the season on Saturday.

Market.

The threatening weather on Saturday morning did not prevent the usual large market and practically every space on the market was taken. There was an abundance of garden produce, with prices about the same as last week. Tomatoes were very reasonable and potatoes sold from 20c. to 25c. peck. Eggs sold from 22c. up. Grapes and peaches were plentiful in the fruit stores, selling at various prices.

Election of Officers.

At the annual election of officers of Argyll Lodge No. 212, I.O.O.F., held on Thursday night, Leslie Richardson was elected Noble Grand, Cecil Joynt was elected vice-grand and the remaining elective officers were all re-elected, namely, E. J. Walters, Recording Secretary, Dr. Harry Loucks, Financial Secretary and F. S. Scott, Treasurer. James S. Douglas is the retiring Noble Grand. The installation of officers will be held in the near future and will be in charge of Matt. Taylor, who was elected District Deputy Grand Master a few months ago.

Crashed Into Bridge.

A car containing Mr. Ben. Cook and his son and two other men, of Toronto, while trying to make the turn at the railroad bridge at the eastern entrance of the town, crashed head on into the stone abutment about 11 o'clock on Thursday morning and the impact was so hard that the car was so badly damaged that its valuation is practically nil. **EXPORT EGG PROSPECTS
GOOD**

Canadian egg export prospects continue to command considerable attention and the first export shipment of current year consisting of 1,000 cases, left Winnipeg on September 8th. This shipment is a little early and it is probable that the bulk of the exports will not start to move until the month of October. With the prospects for a substantial export trade this year and with the storage stocks apparently less than a year ago, the outlook for the egg market during the winter continues quite favorable. On the first of September, storage stocks at Montreal were above last year but at both Toronto and Winnipeg the holdings were lighter than in 1933.—Egg and Poultry Market Review.
