- A. Part of my uniform at all times. What I didn't have on me I carried in the truck.
- Q. Did you carry any identification with you?
- A. Yes, sir. I carried my "I" card at all times.

- A. My pass.
- Q. Now, when you were working and building your house, how long did you intend to stay working at that?
- A. Until I got my house finished.
- Q. How long did you think that would take?
- A. Until the first of November, 1944.
- Q. What did you intend to do then?
- A. I intended to go back to the army, sir.
- Q. Now, will you tell the Court what happened on the 21st of September, 1944.
- A. On the 21st of September I got up in the morning and a neighbour came over and wanted me to haul food for his cow. This cow was the one I got the milk for the family from so I thought I had better haul it in. Well, I was hauling food and while doing so I saw the Provost coming about a quarter of a mile away. I started to walk towards them and they stopped. I said, 'are you looking for me'. They said 'who are you'. I told them.
- Q. How were you dressed at that time?
- A. In my uniform, sir.
- Q. Did they ask any questions?
- A. Yes, sir, they asked me if I had my "I" card.
- Q. What did you tell them?
- A. I said yes, sir.
- Q. Did you show it to them?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did they ask you anything else?
- A. They asked me how long I had been gone. I said around about two months. They said they only got notice three days ago to pick me up.
