

Campbell to supply the whole bench there.

MR. ELLIS: Is that Lorne Campbell?

MR. PATTON: Yes.

THE CHAIRMAN: Does the power line cross this property?

MR. PATTON: It crosses and then comes by Daley's and runs right in ~~the~~ near the old Barco house.

THE CHAIRMAN: It would be the cost of the electric power, that would be the determining point I suppose?

MR. PATTON: I understand a good deal depends on that, whether they complete the line through to Penticton and if so they will have a sub-station at Fairview and then have their line over here.

MR. ELLIS: That seems to be the only solution of it as far as the position under the record is concerned.

THE CHAIRMAN: A second right would be no good to you.

MR. ELLIS: I think not.

MR. BALLS: No, no good whatever. The next is Lower Similkameen Numbers 7 and 8, Skemaoskuan kin. Provincial record dated January 30th, 1897, for 100 inches of water from Skemaoskuan kin Creek. There was a notice published in the B.C. Gazette for 200 inches of water from Skunkamakenosshisten Creek. I imagine that is the same stream.

THE CHAIRMAN: I fancy so. The spelling is a little different, but I think it is the same, is it not?

MR. BALLS: Yes.

MR. ALEXANDER: Which is the creek? The top or north one?

MR. BALLS: The stream recorded is the southern stream. The
