Ireland, either as invaders or immigrants. The Spanish connection and intercourse have left enduring traces the West. On the East coast the Dane has made his mak. Within the Ancient Pale, which included Dublin. and in of Tipperary, all racial results of English settlement have not lost. In Ulster, especially in the North Eastern counties, it is evidwhere the ancestors of people came from, and these only some of the more recent examples out of many that might be cited. The names Fitzpacrick, Fitzgerald and De La Poer tell their own tale of Norman French infrom England. In Vasion remote times tradition and ancient records speak of many races that at various periods settled on the coast and spread into the interior, replacing the earlier occupants, or becoming amalgamated with them. But whether Ireland is a Nation or not, it certainly is a country, and though its inhabitants are of various or mixed descent, they are assuredly a people. The land has in some mysterious way claimed them all as her own, and their offspring as her children, so that without exception, Irishmen born and brought up in the country, are equally distinctively and characteristically Irish, just as
