### Naval Reserve Volunteers.

Preparations for the inauguration of the new London Naval Reserve Volun-teers are being energetically pushed for-ward, says The Daily Graphic, and before very long the sloop Buzzard, which is being fitted out for her new duties in Chatham Dockyard, will take up her moorings at Blackfriars Bridge. The Buzzard, which is a twin-screw vessel, built in 1885, is being thoroughly over-hauled and fitted with quickfiring and machine guns of the latest pattern. When the alterations are completed the masts, funnel and bridge will be removed, in order to allow the ship to pass under the London bridges, and these will be replaced when she reaches her destination. Numbers of men have been already en-listed, and more come forward daily, many enthusiastic yachtsmen being among them. The Hon. Rupert Guinness, eldest son of Lord Iveagh, will command the new body. He is well known as a yachtsman and an oarsman at Henley. The London Division will consist of not fewer than five companies, and each company of at least 100 men. Men are ex-pected to enlist for three years to earn their capitation grant and first supply of kit. They must put in forty drills in the first year and twenty-four in every subsequent year, of not less than one hour each. They may attend for this They may attend for this drill any night from 4 to 8 o'clock. There will be a cruise in some sea-going man-of-war, probably just after the man-oeuvres every year. It will be optional oeuvres every year. It will be optional for a man to take part in this cruise. but one day's service at sea will count as five drills at home.

### A Curious Watch.

In one of the chief watchmaking es ablishments in Zurich, says The London Globe, there is to be seen a remarkable curiosity in the way of watch or clock making. The timeplece is in the form of a ball, which moves imperceptibly down an inclined surface, without rolling. The length of this inclined surface, which is sixteen inches long, is accomplished from top to bottom in twenty-four hours. Ther the "ball" only needs lifting to the top again. This extraordinary timepiece has no spring, and therefore needs no winding. The "hands" are kept in motion by the sliding along an inclined plane.

### A Study of Whales.

Although it is a common belief among sailors that whales, when they "sound" descend to enormous depths in the ocean-and although Dr. Kukenthal has esti-mated that the larger whales commonly dive to a depth of almost two-thirds of a mile, yet, Dr. Recovifza, of the Belgian Antarctic expedition, challenges these statements, and avers that about three hundred feet is the maximum depth to which a whale can dive. He bases this statement partly on the fact that the fish on which they feed, and to obtain which they are accustomed to "sound," dwell near the surface, and partly on the fact the pressure is so great that they could not withstand it, and that their muscular into the regions where it prevails.

Why a change in the discount rate of the Bank of England—the rate at which one bank is willing to lend mquey—should be a matter of such great importance to the money markels of the entire world is a mystery to many people. That a change in the discount rate of the Bank of England does affect the money markets in Berlin, Paris, Vienna and New York, and that it also affects the foreign exchange markets in each of these cities, and offen causes an advance or decline in their stock markets as well, is known to everyone interested in financial subjects. Why a change in the rate at which a single bank is willing to loan money should have such a world-wide effect, however, is not generally understood, even in Wall street, where brokers and speculators make their living by their intimate knowledge of financial subjects. To understand the importance of the Bank of England discount rate it must be remembered that London is the financial centre of the world.

To Study Canal System

The Rochester Chamber of Commerce sent a commissioner into Canada to study the canal system there, in operation under construction and projected, and to ascertain if the artificial waterways there stood in danger from the proposed \$10.000,000 canal across New York State, on which the people are to yote max!
