McKin-non of Melrose, was ordained to the priest-hoca in St. George's Church by His Lord-ship Bishop McDonald, assisted by Revs. James Æ. McDonald and Dr. Walker, Rev. J. R. A. McDonald being master of cere-monies. Besides the officiating clergy, Revs. F. J. McDonald, D. F. McDonald, S. T. Phelav, R. J. Gillis, J. C. McLean, Drs. T. Curren and J. C. McMillan occupied seats in the sanctuary. At the conclusion of the ceremony, Rev. Dr. McMillan preached an eloquent and im-pressive sermon, taking for his text (Matt. xviii, 19-20:) "Going therefore teach ye all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have com manded you, and behold I am with you even to the consumation of the world." In illus-itrating the progress of Catholicity on the island he instanced that Father Francis, who was here present, had closed the venerable Bishop McEachern's eyes in death, and was to day the first to impose hands on the seventh son of the parish, ordained in its third church by the fourth Bishop of the diocese, and after fity-seven years of active service in the sacred ministry was perhaps the most shining example he could present of the dignity of the pristhood. On Mady Fr. McKinnon celebrated his first High Mass, assisted by Revs. J. C. Mc Lean and Dr. McMillan et deacon and sub-deacon. His Lordship Bishop McEonald, Revs. F. J. McDonald and Jas. Æ. THRILLING RESCUE.



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
