Pleased to hear that Mrs. Ross McClean was able to be out for a drive. Mrs. Stillman Haight and little son were guests at her father's last week.

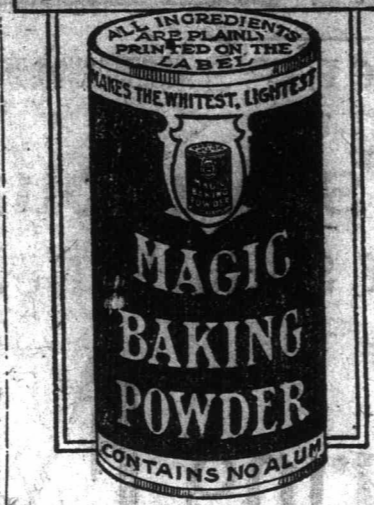
