LAW INTELLIGENCE.

TO THE BAR OF LOWER CANADA.

SECTION OF THE DISTRICT OF QUEBEC. The Committee of the Bar of Lower Canad tion of the District of Quebec, to whom it wa ferred to report to the Bar, at as early an hour a they can, the nature and legality, of the Tariff promulgated on Saturday, the twenty-first instant, by the Justices of Her Majesty's Superior Cour for Lower Canada, having met and considered the subject referred to them, have unanimously agreed upon the following-

Previous to the passing of the 12th Victoria Char. 38, the administration of justice in civil matters in Lower Canada was vested in Courts of original jurisdiction called Courts of Queen's Bench, appointed for the several Districts of Quebec, Three Rivers, Montreal, St.—Francis and Gaspé, which Courts were independent of each other, and possessed the right of establishing rules of Practice and Tables of Fees in their respective Districts, and in noint of fact at the time of the REPORT: of Practice and Tables of Fees in their respective Districts, and in point of fact at the time of the passing of the said Statute, Rules of Practice and Tables of Fees had been established and were in torce in the said several Districts differing from

Tables of Fees had been established and were in locce in the said swereal Districts differing from each other in form and amount.

The Legislature of the Province of Canada by the above mentioged statute abolished the previous Courts of original jurisdiction, and created one Court called the Superior Court for Lower Canada; which was to administer instince in civil mutters throughout the whole of Lower Canada, sitting in sections in the different Districts, aided by a Circuit Court similarly constituted which last was invested with jurisdiction up to a certain amount. The establishment of such Superior and Circuit Courts having jurisdiction throughout the whole of Lower Canada, made it imperative that the Rules of Practice and Tables of Fees should be uniform throughout the several Districts, and to obtain that object it is provided in 168th section of the said Act as follows:—"And for the purpose of ensuring uniformity, in the practice and proceedings of the Superior Court and Circuit Court in the several Districts and Circuit Court in the several Districts and Circuit in Lower Canada; Be it enacted that the Superior Court, on any six or more of the Judges thereof, shall and may (and it shall do their duty so to do within one year from the time when this act shall come fully into effect) agree upon, make and establish Tariffic Fees (or the officers of the said Courts respecyear from the time when this act shall come fully into effect) agree upon, make and establish Tariffs of Fees for the officers, of the said Courts respectively, and the Counsel, Advocates and Atternies practising thereis, and also such Bules of Practice as shall be requisite for regulating the due conduct of the causes, matters and business before the said Courts respectively, or the Judges thereof or any of them, and in Term or out; of Term, and all proverse and proceedings thereis or thereunto relatives powers and proceedings therein or thereunto relating; and such Tariff of Fees and Rules of Practice ling; and such, Tariff of Fees and Rules of Practice respectively, being signed by any aix of the said Judges, shall without faither formally, and inmediately upon the receipt thereof, or of a copy certified by the Prothonotary of the Superior Court having the custody of the original, be entered by the Prothonotaries and Clerks of the Superior Court or of the Circuit Court in the, registers of the said Courts respectively; and then shall have full force and effect in each District or Circuit in which they have been as registered until they shall have been power and authority from time to time to repeal or amend the said Tariffs and Rules of Practice or any part thereof, and such repeal or amendment being signed by any six or more of the said Judges, shall be registered as aforesaid by the proper Protonotories or Clerks, and shall have effect accordingly: Provided always that no such rule of Practice shall be contrary to or any other act or Law in force in Lower Ganada, otherwise the same shall be void; and Provided also that until such Tariffs of fees and Rulesi of Practice respectively shall be made and established as aforesaid, the Tariff of fees and Rulesi of Practice in force in each District or Circuit immediately before the time when this sict that forme into effect with regard to the Court of Tariff court on the interest of Circuit and the proceedings therein as far as regards such District or Circuit, except that in all cases in the Circuit Court in which the sum or value of the thing in dispute shall exceed twenty pounds currency, the tariff of fees in force at the time aforesaid with regard to the same class of cases in the Court of Queen's Bench in any District shall be the tariff for the Circuit Court in the same District, suntil a Tariff shall be made forsuch cases under this section."
