GAINS FOR BOTH THE BRITISH AND FRENCH

LONDON, April 16.—The British captured last night the village of Velleret, southeast of Hagicourt, according to an official statement issued by the British war office. They also made progress northwest of Lens.

Large captures of guns and war material were made by the British at Livin and on the Souchez river in the Lens region, the statement announces. The cannon taken includes a six inch naval gun of long range. Truck loads of new tools many thousand rounds of munitions and quantities of bombs, grenades and engineering equipment also were captured.

THE FRENCH OFFICIAL REPORT

Paris, April 16 (Noon).—The French penetrated the German second line last night at several points in Alsace. The war office reports that great numbers of German dead were found in the trenches, which had been torn up by the French shell fire. Prisoners and booty were brought back by the French. Lens Evacuated By The Civil Population

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, April 15.—The civil population of Lens was evacuated Friday. The Germans then seized three months rations gathered in Lens by the American Relief Commission.

British Patrols Have Entered Lens

LONDON, April 15.—British patrols entered Lens between four and five o'clock this morning, according to a dispatch received from the special correspondent of Lloyd's News.

FOUR OF CREW OF N. S. SCHOONER RESCUED AFTER BEING 90 HOURS AT SEA IN OPEN BOAT.

BOSTON, April 16.—After ninety hours in an open boat, Captain Theodore Doucette and four members of the crew of the schooner John Beacham were rescued at sea by the steam trawler Wave, eight days out, and brought here yesterday. The men were frozen so badly that it was necessary to lift them into the rescuing boat.

For twenty hours they had been without food or water and much of the time they were exposed to a snow storm. The Beacham was bound from Liverpool, N. S., for New York, with wood pulp when her seams opened in a stiff southwest gale, forcing the crew to take to the boats.
