FIRE IN ATHENS. Boddy's Herness Shop Destroyed by Fire on Menday Night - Building and Stock a Total Loss

Shortly after ten o'clock on Monday evening, a fire was discovered in the small wooden building on Main street, between the Central Block and the Mansel store, in which Samuel Boddy & Son carried on a harness shop. The bell on the fire hall and the saw gong were soon making it known to the citizens that for the first time in over six months the fire field was abroad in six months the fire fiend was abroad in in the village. In less than five min-utes after the first alarm was given, the engine was hauled to the tank opposite the Kincaid Block, but owing to the darkness and the ice on the sidewalk, the men were unable to find the trap door over the tank, and the engine was taken over to the well in front of the Armstrong House and set to work. The fire, which seemed to to work. The fire, which seemed to have caught from the stove near the centre of the ground flat, soon reached the stairway and a roaring mass of flanes was soon working up between the sheeting and the plaster. A powerful stream of water was sent in through the windows, but in a few windows the flames have through the minutes the flames burst through the roof. A dozen willing hands got out the big fire-hook and catching it on top of the front pulled the whole front out to the side-walk. A couple of men took the hose up into the second story and after tearing off some of the lathing a stream was got down between the timbers. The building, which was a solid frame, had bee planked up on the outside and then clapboarded. The fire worked down between these spaces, and no sooner was one place flooded than another would show signs of tire. Owing to would snow signs or ure. Owing to its dangerous proximity to other Valuable property, it was deemed safest to pull the building down, and the men set to work with a will and the men set to work with a will and soon had one side out and the roo down. All this time the men had bee

keeping a heavy stream pouring on the building from the tank to which the engine had been moved. The ortter cold froze the water to the lothing of the firemen and the engine ad to be kept moving to prevent it being frozen up.
