Golden Text-"Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.".-Pro. 14, 34.

For the remainder of this quarter and part of the next we study the disgraceful, descending, degradation and demoralization of the Kingdom of Israel. Both kings reigned cotemporary with Jehosaphat, the good king of Judah, which kingdom continued about 150 years after the northern kingdom was destroyed.

He has the worst record of any of Israel's kings, but no other king had such help in wickedness and sin from a wife like Jezebel, whose name has become a household word for devilishness. Verse 33 tells us that this king and queen did more to provoke the Lord God of Israel to anger than all the rulers of Israel who were before them. So much for a bad man marrying a worse woman.
