PACIFIC LINER WRECKED.

Valencia Aground on West Coast of Vancouver Island-Serious Loss of Life Is Feared.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 24.—A great marine disaster has occurred near Carmanah, off the west coast of Vancouver Island. The steamer Valencia San Francisco, a regular liner plying between points in California and Washington, Victoria and the north, and which was due in Victoria Monday night, was wrecked off Cape Beale, so the subpray on a rocky and perilog. going ashore on a rocky and perilous place. The first news of the disaster reached Captain Gandin, Receiver of Wrecks, late yesterday afternoon upon the arrival of nine of the survivors in a boat which succeeded in landing at the telegraph huts on the coast sever-al miles from the scene of the disas-ter. The information obtainable from them as to the loss of life when the valencia struck and the crew and passengers took to the boats is of the vaguest sort.

Over a Hundred On Board.

There were considerably over a hundred persons on board. Mr. Paterson, the lighthousekeeper at Cape Beale, wired that sixty persons had been drowned, and asked that assistance be rushed from Victoria at the earliest regression.

The vessel is reported against a cliff The vessel is reported against a clift and the survivors who reached shore mear Carmanah are the only men who can furnish any details of the affair. They have already told their story, although a disconnected one. The reason the vessel proceeded so far north and how she came to strike on the coast still remains unexplained.

The passenger list is not yet obtainable, but Victorians are looking on the present vessel for W. H. Langley, a well-known local barrister, and his bride, formerly Miss Raiss. Another bridal couple on board are J. Downey of Saanich and wife, the latter a Miss Camp. Messrs, J. Lyle, a former purser of the Rosalie, and Fay, an insurance man, were also on board. The steamer Queen City, which left here last night for the west ocast, had on board a number of Indians, who were to land both at Cloose and Pachena Bay, where the Valencia is. This being the case, the Queen City could not fall to see the stranded vessel, and may have already rendered help.

To Attempt a Rescue.

The steamer Queen City will bring the survivors to Victoria in the morning. The lost may be safely put at about ninety. Two young men, Daykin and Logan, have gone to the scene in a small boat with ropes in hope of rescuing two men who are on the face of the cliff and unable to get up or back to the ship and in peril from the rising tide.
