A Plea For the Birds.

DEAR SIR,—Being much impressed by an article in the 'Christian Herald' on the value of the woodpecker I give it below, slightly condensed:

'The woodpecker has beautiful plumage but his industry is more tireless and his service to man is more generous than his feathers are attractive.'

A small boy that tries to knock him off his perch with a stone, or who destroys him with a gun, does not realize that there are few creatures in nature that render such valuable service to man as he.

Secretary Wilson, of the U. S. Agricultural Department, says that in this age of wicked timber waste, man has no greater single aid in the preservation of lumber than the woodpecker. The secretary estimated that insects in the U. S. destroy at least \$100,000,000 dollars worth of timber each year and that forty-five species of woodpeckers are the most deadly enemies these insects have.

With unerring accuracy they locate their prey and driving into the timber they with their hard beaks gather them and their families.

The department scientists have examined the crops of more than 1,000 of these birds and found that their food consists of the bodies and eggs of these insects and destroyers of trees. The Creator has provided the woodpecker with an insatiable appetite and a hard and strong beak and furnishes him his food, but he must hammer hard and bore deep to secure the food provided for him.

Perhaps at some other time, Mr. Editor, with your kind permission, a word may be said in favor of some other of those creatures which God's good providence has placed on the earth, often though much despised by man, to his great advantage.

Ordination at Chester.

On Tuesday, Aug. 8th, a council composed of delegates of the United Baptist churches of Lunenburg county was convened to consider the advisability of setting apart to the Gospel Ministry Jas. D. MacLeod, B. A., Acadia '11.

After a vigorous examination during which the candidate was questioned as to his conversion, call to preach and general knowledge of Biblical Doctrine it was unanimously recommended that the Church be advised in ordaining their pastor elect to the Ministry.

The services of ordination were held in the evening. Rev. D. O. Simpson, New Germany, the Moderator of the council, presided and offered the ordaining prayer. The sermon was preached by Rev. H. T. DeWolfe. The charge to the Church was given by Rev. B. D. Knott, of Mahone; the charge to the candidate by Rev. E. C. Rieborough, of Lunenburg, while the welcome to the county was given by Rev. (Mr.) MacDougall, of Chester Basin. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. J. D. MacLeod.

Mr. MacLeod has already won a large place for himself in the church as well as in the town of Chester and the success of his ministry seems assured.

Another Drought.

MR. EDITOR.—In 1849 we had a drought lasting into October. Father Harding offered special prayer for rain at the morning Sunday service. In September a severe storm of rain and infectious dysentery occurred in Greenwich from a case on board a vessel that came from New York. Dr. R. L. Brown was called to visit the sick on board when the vessel arrived. He contracted blood poisoning the abscesses of which confined him to his room for some weeks. There were some twenty deaths in the families of the Greenwich district from the disease. I have never known an epidemic of that disease in this county since that time. Everywhere there were many cases of diarrhoea, cholera, etc., that season, not traceable to this imported infection.

The only obtainable water, besides some good wells between here and Kentville, was a spring in Willow Hollow and some pools in Hancock Brook. The country was parched in to powder. Are we to have it again? R. N. P.
