### Boon for Somerville and Victoria. St. John Fair Grounds Changed.

The OBSERVER has been asked by some of the parties concerned to "agitate" the establishing of a free mail delivery between Hartland and Victoria. Upon enquiry it is found that free delivery is established only on existing mail routes. In this case most of the road to be travelled is already a daily route, and in case the free delivery is inaugurated the money saved by the abolition of the the Somerville office will pay for the new ground covered, which would be from the bridge road to Henry Ginson's.

The cost to the people served is \$3.00; the actual cost of the box furnished by the government. The box is to be mounted on a post set near the highway, and will be served with daily mail, forever, without any further cost to the box owner. Registered mail may be delivered, and the idea is practically that each person may have his own postoffice.

No boxes will be served at a less distance than a quarter mile from the regular post office. With the Victoria office at its present location the nearest office that could be served would be, probably, H. P. Birmingham's.

The OBSERVER has interviewed Mr. Carvell with a view to inaugurating the route and he will do what he can to bring it about. In the meantime all people living along the proposed route are requested to make application for boxes. Those desirous of the free service need only notify the OBSERVER, from which office the names will be forwarded to the parties in control of the matter. If the majority are desirous of taking boxes and are willing for the abolition of the Somerville office, the free route will undoubtedly be brought into action without delay.

The editor can explain any detail which anyone may require.

The few remaining weeks between to-day and the opening of the great Dominion Exhibition in St. John, N. B., will be filled with the finishing details of making what will unquestionably be the exposition line. Already the familiar aspect of the Exhibition grounds is so greatly changed that regular visitors to the St. John fall fairs will stand amazed upon entering the improved show-plant. In front of the main buildings the ticket offices have been deeply recessed off the street to allow carriage-ways and prevent congestion of traffic; inside the main buildings the principal entrance has been widened, a new music gallery has been erected over the concert platform; Machinery Hall has had its capacity doubled; the new building which adjoins the parent structures will lend an entirely new appearance to the show, and with the Horticultural and Agricultural display in the military drill shed, the transportation exhibits in the spacious quarters of the old Agricultural Hall; Poultry Show back of the 208 foot grand-stand, etc., the Dominion Fair will present the St. John grounds in an almost new light.

### The Defeat of Presque Isle.
