She presented him and the others with a personal greeting card, a silver pencil and a medal. Lieut. McCallum describes her as a "plain, simple, charming woman." Lieut. USES RIFLE TO PROTECT PROPERTY

Hartland Was Before the Court
—Summary of County Court Cases—

County Court is in session at Woodstock this week. Judge Carleton addressing the grand jury referred fittingly to the cessation of hostilities, and thanked all concerned in their help to him in his work of re-creating, and commended the people for their wholehearted contributions to the various patriotic outbursts and the victory loans.

In all the criminal cases the grand jury found true bills. At the time of going to press but one case had been disposed of, that of the King vs. Maudsley Davis. This case, it will be remembered, caused much excitement when it first came up in the court of Parish Court. Commissioner Noble at Bristol, Larise, a returned soldier, was employed as Dominion police and was engaged to see that the provisions of the M.S.A. were properly carried out. It was charged that he arrested certain persons whom he encountered not having with them their proper identification cards. These he released, so the information stated, on payment of various sums. He was convicted on the second count, a charge of obtaining in any under false pretences, and he remained for sentence until court closes.

The King vs. Maudsley Davis on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences is being tried today. It is claimed that he received an advance on some hay from Matthias Mesinger and refused to deliver the hay.

The King vs. Charles Wright for assault on H. M. Martell is also occupying the attention of the court today. Still another case is the King vs. Wilmot Shannon for assault on Robert Shannon, another chapter in the litigation from Greenfield that goes on from session to session. A case attracting much local interest will come up tomorrow. This is the King vs. Roy Rigby, charged with shooting at Fred Clarke with intent to do grievous bodily harm. The incident upon which this is founded occurred only on Tuesday of this week, and the scene of the alleged misdemeanor is a mile above the town of Hartland. The simplest terms the story can be told in is that Rigby forbade Clarke breaking out a winter road across his farm, and told him he would shoot if he crossed the line. Clarke did not cross, but Rigby fired several shots, within the line. It is quite likely that if he aimed at Clarke he would have hit him, as he is a noted crack shot. Mr. Rigby informed The Observer that he purposely fired within the line, and that his reason for firing was to make trespassing on his land an undesirable proceeding.

The origin of this matter is the claims of the residents of

the upper Rockland road to have a new road made to avoid an almost impassible hill. The road was laid out by the proper officials and settlement was made with all the property owners affected but Rigby. He refused to accept the proffered payment, and the money has been deposited with the county secretary pending such time as Rigby might see fit to accept it. The denouement of the whole affair will probably be announced tomorrow.

SALVATION ARMY DRIVE PROGRESSING

Amounts Apportioned to Different Districts

The Committee appointed to apportion to each school district the same each will be asked to contribute to the Salvation Army Million Dollar Drive have been very busy at work during the past week. Last evening Chairman Morgan and Secretary Cameron of the committee called at The Observer office and presented for publication the following facts:

Each district has been asked to give really a small sum and it is expected that each will go well over the top. There has been apportioned to Newburgh district \$10; Lower Brighton \$20; Hartland \$150; Upper Brighton \$15; East Brighton \$10; Highgate \$10; Ashland \$15; Coldstream \$25; East Coldstream \$15; Bannock \$10; Lower Windsor \$15; Windsor \$50; Armond \$15; Knowlsville \$10; Mainstream \$10; Carleton \$15; Howard Brook \$10; Cloverdale \$15; East Cloverdale \$10. One or two collectors will be appointed in each place who will go among their neighbors and solicit funds for the purpose. The money is to carry on the good work of the Salvation Army in caring for wounded soldiers, returned soldiers, and their dependents. The Army has spent more than \$2,000,000 in its good work and has never before asked for a single dollar of help.

Every section of country and every creed will gladly give a little to help on this work. Soliciting will commence and conclude next week. Carleton county is expected to give \$3000, and will readily do so.

TOWN FATHERS IN THEIR FIRST SESSION

Appoint Committees and Officers
and Get Ready for Real Work

Thursday, Jan. 6, marked an epoch in Hartland. On that day the first town council had its first session for business. Mayor Keith was in the chair and the full board of aldermen were in their places. It was deemed fitting that the blessing of God be called on the auspicious event and accordingly Rev. T. Spencer Crisp, pastor of the Methodist church, read a chapter of the Book of Daniel, offered a prayer, and made a short and very fitting address.

Mayor Keith addressed the aldermen, briefly expressing his appreciation of the honor conferred on him and promising to carry on the duties of office to the best of his ability. He felt that there was much need of careful, painstaking work and urged each alderman to forget self-interest, sectional or party interests, and devote himself to the new town.

The town is entitled to send a representative to the county or 1, and Frank Hagerman was given the honor. He will prove a valuable member at the council board.

Owen Clark was appointed road commissioner.

M. L. Hayward was designated as town clerk and since he will be present at each session his service as legal adviser will be always available.

Frank R. Kelly, Esq., is the town treasurer and it will be his duty to collect the taxes.

A. L. Baird was appointed auditor.

The work of preparing the Bye-Laws is completed and the council is ready for its first real meeting which will be held some evening next week. Thereafter regular meetings will be held monthly.

The water works corporation and the school district are still separate from the town. The latter is likely to remain separate but it is likely that at the forthcoming session of the legislature an act will be passed merging the water works with the town corporation.

The doings of the next session of the council will, as was the last, be of historic interest and will be swathed with much interest.

Bring the session a resolution as follows was moved by Alderman Morgan and seconded by Alderman Cameron:

"Resolved, that the council of town of Hartland place on record our expression of deep gratitude and thanksgiving to Almighty God for the glorious victory he has given to our armies and our allies which has brought about the cessation of hostilities, and the prospect of an early and everlasting peace, and further resolved That we place on record an expression of our grateful appreciation and admiration for those brave heroes who have so
