CAMPBELLTON'S TOWN COUNCIL ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION

LITTLE sectional interest has been evidenced during the past week over the pending civic elections and none seemed to be particularly enamored of the thought of municipal honors. The retiring members from the Council are Mayor A. E. Alexander and councillors G. E. Asker, P. W. Hall and F. F. Matheson the latter to accept the Police Magistracy.

There seems to be an expression of general satisfaction and faith in the new Board, that the town's stewardship is in safe keeping.

Generally speaking it ought not to be necessary to every year put the town to the expense of a civic election, attending ill will etc., although an election every second or third year is sure to give the situation a rounding up that otherwise would probably not be so generally understood.

The present life of Councilorship is a critical one, the town is experiencing a wave of unprecedented progress and to keep pace with our opportunities it will not do to stifle enterprise by putting a fence round taxation, yet at such a time, rash legislation is an easy noose.

Provincial Legislature.

Fredericton N. B., Apr. 15th.—In the Legislature to-day the Debate on the fishery resolution was continued the speakers being Messrs Clarke, Loggie, Morrison and Hazen against it, and Hon. Messrs Tweedie, Hill, and Pugsley and Mr. Burns in favor of it. Mr. Clarke concluded by moving an amendment providing that before attempt is made to get New Brunswick's share of the Halifax award, the Govt. should see that the burden of defense of the fisheries should not be saddled on the provinces. The amendment was lost by a vote of 25 to 10 and the resolution carried on the same vote reversed.

Easter Services.
The services of Easter Day were attended by large congregations of members of the church, met together to celebrate this great day of the Christian year.

The church had been appropriately decorated with flowers, amongst which was a beautiful Easter lily. The well known hymns were beautifully sung, and sermons appropriate for the day delivered.

In the afternoon a children's service was held, at which the Lenten offerings of the Sunday School scholars were presented. These offerings are collected in all Church Sunday Schools during Lent, to aid the missions of the Diocese. This year the scholars of the Campbellton Sunday School collected, chiefly in cents, the sum of \$10.85, the largest in the history of the parish.

The service was marked with special interest by the baptism of the children of three well known families in the parish, including the little daughter of one of the Church Warden's.

On Monday evening the annual Parish Meeting for the election of officers for the ensuing year, and other business, was held. The meeting was well attended. A satisfactory financial statement was given by the Warden, and the Rector (for the Sunday School) the following officers were elected:

Resolution of condolence with the families of the late J. D. Sowerby and McLean, formerly members of the vestry, having been directed.

Other matters were held over for further discussion, at an adjourned meeting to be held on Monday, four weeks from the last meeting at 8 o'clock.

Lord's Day Alliance Meeting.

Rev. George Shearer, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance spent yesterday in town in the interests of that body. In the afternoon a conference was held in the English Church and in the evening a mass meeting in the Methodist Church was addressed by Mr. Shearer. The clergymen of the four Protestant denominations and the officers of the local branch took part. After the opening exercises conducted by Revs. Messrs Thomas, Watkins and Carr, Rev. Mr. Thomas called on D. J. Bruce President of the Local Branch of the Alliance to take the chair. When a report of the work done by the local branch during the past year had been given by the Secretary, Mr. J. T. Reid and that of their financial standing, in the absence of the Treasurer, Mr. J. E. Miller, by Rev. Mr. Keirstead, Mr. Bruce introduced the speaker of the evening Mr. Shearer. He delivered a very interesting address on "Our Canadian Sabbath" pointing out that in the struggle for the preservation of the sanctity of the Sabbath the life of the nation was at stake as instanced by the standing of the nations of to-day and the life as well as the character of the working man. The two greatest enemies which menace it are Greed and Selfishness—money making and pleasure. He showed the possibilities of the Alliance by quoting several instances in which its intervention has prevailed in stopping the violation of the Sabbath in both directions.

At the close of the meeting, at the call of the President, the number of members was largely augmented. The same officers were appointed for the ensuing year and a committee of three from each of the churches was added to the executive to solicit new members.

The meeting was largely attended and much appreciated. Rev. Mr. Carr expressed his regret at being obliged to leave before the close as he had "to preside over another Alliance meeting".

Commercial Hotel broken into Monday morning.

It seems that about 3 o'clock Monday morning the bar of the Commercial Hotel was broken into and robbed of liquor and money. Investigation was instituted and about nine o'clock Albert Kelly was arrested, charged with the theft. Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock the prisoner was brought before Magistrate Matheson and was sent up for trial at the July courts.

Wednesday morning the prisoner was lodged in the county jail at Dalhousie.

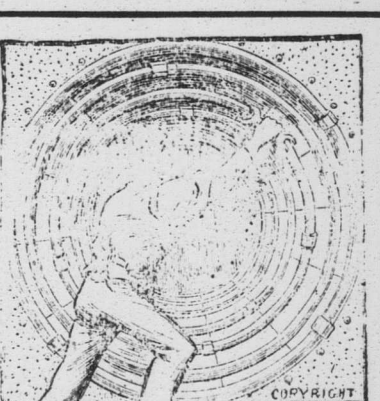
