Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Aug. 14.  
Princess Frederica Charles of Hesse, youngest sister of the German Emperor, has been robbed of costly jewellery. While starting from Victoria station for Germany, the Princess was surrounded by members of the British Royal Family and a number of foreign diplomats who had accompanied her to the railway station to say farewell. The police authorities took strict precautions to keep outsiders at a distance, but as soon as the train had started, the bag was missed. Efforts to keep the theft secret were made, but the matter became known when the description of the property, which is priceless, was given out by Scotland Yard.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.  
By the narrow margin of five votes, the House has passed the Wool Tariff Revision Bill over President Taft's veto. This was made possible only by the defection of twenty-one Republicans, who voted with the Democrats. The announcement created wild scenes in the House. Whilst the Democratic and Progressive leaders in the Senate do not believe that the Wool Bill can be passed there over the President's veto, they will continue their demand for action on the Cotton Tariff Measure.

HALIFAX, Aug. 14.  
A marconigram to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, this afternoon, says that the steamer Eric, Capt. Corner, from Rosario for Quebec, with a load of maize, went ashore during a thick fog at 11.30 to 11.45, south of the Marconi station, and was lying in an easy position. The Captain says that she could be hoisted if a powerful tug were sent quickly. No suitable tug was available here, and the Dominion Coal Co. at Sydney will likely send assistance. The Eric was going to Sydney, probably for coal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.  
The Allan liner Corsican has not moved from her position, 120 miles east of Belle Isle, since her collision with an iceberg. The Lake Champlain is standing by her, and the fog is lifting. No further word from Capt. Cook has been announced since his message that he would proceed to Liverpool as soon as the fog lifted, as the damage was small and entirely above the water line. The fact that the vessel has not moved since the accident and that the Lake Champlain is still standing by, causes some anxiety.

## Gull Island Notes

The trapping season is about over here although very few traps are yet taken out of the water except those that were destroyed beyond repair in the recent storm. The catch so far is not up to the average for traps, and trawls and hook and line about the worst on record. The fishermen are greatly hindered in their work by the presence of dogfish. Potatoes are growing fairly well lately. The hay crop will be almost nil.

A very important and far reaching decision was given at Lower Island Cove by Magistrate Vatcher on the 5th inst. He summoned a resident of this settlement some time previous for building a flake over and obstructing a public road. This resident is one of our young men who spent some years at Sydney Mines. He came home a year or two ago and settled down. It appeared from the evidence that he was building up the property that his father and his grandfather had used for fishing purposes years ago. A number of witnesses were called in support of the defendant, among whom was the Chairman of the Road Board who swore that there was no obstruction and that the path was as wide and wider under this flake as any other flake in the settlement. The case was heard by the Magistrate, Alan Hudson, and Jabez Legrow, both J.P.s. The flake had to be taken down by the 7th inst., or the defendant

would be fined twenty dollars. All three concurred in this decision. As most of the flakes in almost every settlement in this District are over the paths or bye road, this ordering away of one man's flake is thought by the people to be a rather hasty decision on the part of those gentlemen.
