SPRINGTIME DIET.

With the first Spring breezes come pimples, blotches and a general unhealthy complexion appearance. It is then that one should exercise care to clear the blood of all impurities. In days gone by, grandmother would take the good old fashioned remedy of sulphur and molasses.

Such a girl begins to improve affairs by a little attention to her diet. The heavy meats, like ham, pork and sausage, with thick gravies, she abandons or partakes of sparingly. She chooses a poached egg or crisp bacon for breakfast with thin toast, never forgetting the orange or grapefruit as the first course. For lunch there is the juicy chop or salad, with fruit, and for dinner there is rare roast beef or chicken, with a thin gravy, always a green vegetable such as spinach or peas, and always a green salad, with plenty of olive oil and preferably lemon juice instead of vinegar.

Fruit is indeed the keynote of Spring diet which shall help to improve the complexion. Apples, raw and cooked, baked or as sauce; any of the wholesome citrus family, in itself a whole pharmacopoeia of goodness the lemon, the orange and the grapefruit.

These eaten lavishly and freely are indeed health and beauty at any time of the year, as well as the Springtime. Then to augment all of this, such things as string onions, chives and parsley are helpful, with crisp salads of romaine, endive or escarole, always with plenty of lemon juice and olive oil. These things not forgetting plenty of water taken between meals, should obviate all necessity of physic.

Feast of the Annunciation.

To-day is the Feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and, though not a holiday of obligation, is a day of particular devotion in the Roman Catholic Church.

The Annunciation is the beginning of Jesus in His human nature. Through His mother He is a member of the human race. The virginity of Mary before, during, and after, the conception of her Divine Son has always been regarded as part of the deposit of Faith. The Incarnation of the Son of God did not in itself necessitate this exception from the laws of nature. Only reasons of expediency are given for it, chiefly the end of the Incarnation.

About to found a new generation of the Children of God, the Redeemer does not arrive in the way of earthly generations. The power of the Holy Spirit enters the chaste Virgin, forming the humanity of Christ. Many holy fathers of the Church say that the consent of Mary was essential to the Redemption. "It was the will of God," says St. Thomas, "that the redemption of mankind should depend upon the consent of the Virgin Mary. This does not mean that God in His plans, was bound by the will of a creature, and that man would not have been redeemed if Mary had not consented. It only means that the consent of Mary was from all eternity, and was therefore received as essential into the design of God."

To-day throughout the whole civilized world the Roman Catholic commemorates in a particular manner the occasion of that Angelical Salutation: "Hail, full of Grace, the Lord is with thee," the salutation which was, so to speak, the official announcement that the work of man's redemption was about to be begun.

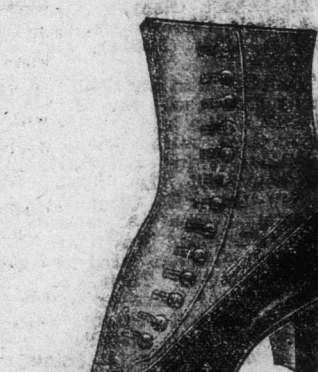

PEARL WORTH \$40,000.

A large pearl found recently in Western Australia was reported on as follows by the Secretary of the Fisheries Department: "The gem was found in a blister in the adductor muscle of a 5-pound mother-of-pearl shell. The blister was 1-1/4 inches long, 1 inch wide, and 7-8 inch in length. This blister, on being opened, was found to contain a perfectly round pearl of 100 gr., being cleaned down to 96 gr. The pearl, although marked slightly, is a very valuable one, and if it can be cleaned to a perfect lustre and should retain its shape, it should realize \$40,000."
