Outdoing Mahomet.

We used to think when we read at school about how Mahomet moved the mountains, that it was a marvellous feat, but in these wonder days of ours, even Mahomet's power does not seem so remarkable. On the outskirts of the city of Rio de Janeiro there is a hill which is called Costello Hill, and it has always been an eyesore to the inhabitants because it kept off the cooling breezes from their city. They used to talk about moving it but for a long time it was considered impracticable. Now a syndicate has been formed, and before long they believe they will have outdone Mahomet. Its removal will cost two million pounds, and they will have to take away forty-seven million cubic yards of earth before the city can get the benefit of the breeze.

Fate of Truthful Spies.

Very early in the war two German spies got to the Orkneys disguised as neutrals. There were very few precautions in those days, and ships were calling at Kirkwall frequently. The spies got back to Germany, and gave the astounding information to the Chief of Intelligence that there were no defences at Scapa. They persisted in their story under the closest examination, with the result that they were taken out and shot. The German naval authorities were quite convinced that their spies had been tampered with and were bringing them an enemy trap, since they fully believed that Scapa Flow was proof against submarines when, in fact, it was really without efficient defences.

The New Government

The new Government of the H. A. Squires is now installed in St. John's and—like they say of young boys with all its troubles to come, it has already arisen in the resignation of Mr. MacDonnell, one of the two only Roman Catholic representatives of the Squires party elected to the new Parliament will be (unless other changes take place in the meantime) a shinties

In the Squires and Coaker party combined there is one Catholic only, this may or may not lead to difficulties, but in a country so sectarian as Newfoundland we should not be in the least surprised to see an entire re-grouping before long.
The new Government has already named its Cabinet which is as follows:
Premier and Colonial Secretary—Hon. H. A. Squires.
Finance and Customs—Hon. H. Brownrigg.
Justice—Hon. W. R. Warren.
Marine & Fisheries—Hon. W. Baker.

Education—Hon. Dr. Barnes.
P. M. General—Hon. W. W. Hall.
Public Works—Mr. W. B. Jennings.
Agriculture and Mines—Hon. D. Campbell.
Shipping—Mr. W. H. Garver.
Other members of the Cabinet are: Hon. Geo. Shea and S. J. Foote.
A new department—that of Education—has been created (which means a couple of thousands of dollars more salary for another official) and the General has become a member of the Cabinet, thus standing or falling with the Government of the day. Instead of being a permanency as in the past, the former is the practice followed in England and Canada, Hon. J. Robinson designs.

What the new Government will accomplish time will tell. It is startling to much flourish of trumpets on the part of Star and Advocate. Whether it will succeed in reducing the highest of living we very much doubt but there is no doubt that many people do support it believe it can.
There is no doubt about the quality of the vote given to the new Government, and the solidity of the support the Squires party was a surprise even to itself. The Coakerites lost nothing of their strength but rather tipped if anything, and Mr. Jennings' vote in this election exceeded that of Robert Bond in 1913. This increased vote recorded chiefly in the land towns, where contrary to their expectations, and we may say also of our own, the Cashin candidates could not have received a very strong vote.—Willingate Sun.

Under Four Flags.

SHIP WITH A CAREER.

Sydney, N.S., Dec. 4.—The S. S. Pipsos, which loaded bunker coal at the Dominion Coal Company's pier on Wednesday, has down the flag of four different nations during her career. The Pipsos, until six months ago, was owned by a German firm, but was then taken over by the British government. During the whole of the war the Pipsos was at Antwerp, Belgium. At the start of the war she was captured by the Belgian government, and was soon after captured by the Germans when they took Antwerp. Notwithstanding the fact that she was docked for the four years of the fighting the Pipsos has had some narrow escapes from being destroyed. When the Germans shelled Antwerp she was several times, and some of the present crew of the vessel have souvenirs in the shape of pieces of the shells which fell upon her deck.

The Pipsos was built in England, and her first name was the Castilla. She was next sold to the French, and later they disposed of her to the Germans.
The Pipsos arrived here from Cuba, at Norfolk, Virginia, where she had hard time to get enough bunker coal to carry her to Sydney. She was detained for 12 days at Norfolk. The like situation in the United States is very acute and there were over 50 steam vessels at Norfolk waiting to load coal. As the Pipsos had a perishable cargo she was given the preference over some of the other vessels, and as a result, she got just enough coal to get her to Sydney. She has a cargo of raw sugar and is bound for Queenstown, Ireland, for orders. The men on the Pipsos naturally notice the great change in weather between Cuba and this country. Before they left Cuba they were busily engaged swatting mosquitoes and trying to keep cool, now they have all they can do to keep warm.
