

With the Rod.

Geo. LeMoine and M. Basha went to Harry's Brook on Friday and returned home on Sunday with three very fine salmon.

Chas. Parsons, Jr., spent a couple of days at Harry's Brook last week and secured three salmon, the heaviest weighing 35 lbs.

The water in Serpentine River was very low last week, and some rain is now needed to put that river in good fishing condition.

Recent arrivals from the Serpentine Valley state that sea trout in the Serpentine this season were very large but so far not in great numbers. Many salmon and trout could be seen last week at the lower pool, and outside, and with the first rain fall these fish will be moving up stream.

Dr. C. B. Parker, of Brooklyn, N.Y., who was on a fishing trip to the Upper Humber, came down to Curling on Saturday. The doctor had one week of very good fishing. His heaviest fish weighed 26½ lbs., and he landed several 20-pounders. After the first week the water dropped in the river due to the continuous dry weather, and is now quite low. Dr. Parker went west by Monday's express and will spend some days whipping the pools of the Codroy Valley.

Geo. W. Stewart, S. D. McLellan, Judge of Probate, and M. M. McLearn, chief train dispatcher, all of Truro, came to Curling last week from Serpentine River, where they had been salmon fishing. In eight days the party landed 33 salmon, averaging 10½ lbs. each, the smallest fish weighed eight and the heaviest 19 lbs. They also had some splendid sea trout fishing, and Mr. Stewart landed one weighing 6½ lbs. They had several very fine days fishing at first, but the dry weather of late has considerably reduced the water in the river, but many fish could be seen hovering about the mouth. Mr. Stewart, who caught four fine fish in the Humber last year, and dipping after scales at 38 lbs., is remaining on the coast for a few weeks longer, and left for the Upper Humber on Friday. The rest of the party left for home by Wednesday's No. 2 express.




