## Digging up History

There is a great deal of romance in the science of excavation, as people come to realize as the result of the Tutankhamen discoveries, but there is much that is interesting concerning many famous excavators and their work about which little has been heard.

The discovery of the clue to the ancient Egyptian writing, the unearthing of the priceless Rosetta Stone and the Elgin Marbles, now reposing in the British Museum, are some of the outstanding achievements of archaeologists, and the story of these and other finds is told by Mr. David Mas-

ters in "The Romance of Excavation" (John Lane).  
The excavator has a vast area in which to set to work. He may dig fifty feet and find nothing and another man may come along, set up his tent a few yards away, just scratch the surface of the soil, and find a buried city.

**A Wonder of the World.**  
The discovery of the tomb of Tutankhamen is a case in point. Week after week the diggers worked, and, as nothing resulted, Mr. Howard Carter and the late Lord Carnarvon thought of abandoning the quest. They decided to dig just one more day. They did so, and made the great discovery.

The Rosetta Stone was discovered by a member of Napoleon's army who, noticing the strange lettering, added it to his booty. When Napoleon was defeated the stone passed into the possession of the British.  
It was by studying this stone that Dr. Young, an English medical man, solved the secret of Egyptian writing and laid bare much of the history of ancient Egypt.

Equally romantic was the finding by Professor Flinders Petrie of the long-lost city of Naukratis. An Arab offered to sell the Professor part of an alabaster statuette, the scientist recognised it as a very early Greek work. (The Arab told him where he had got it. The Professor took train to the place, searched for and found the spot, with the result that excavations were started and the city unearthed.)

Lord Elgin played a great part in adding still further to the work done by British pioneers in revealing the wonders of the past in Greece. At that time the Turks were destroying everything they could that existed of ancient Greek art, and Lord Elgin's excavations were made in the face of strong opposition from the despoilers. By wholesale bribery he succeeded in his work, but not until he had spent £50,000 of his own money. When he got the treasures to England—the ship sank on the way and the stones lay for three years on the ocean bed before they were raised—the authorities began to seek opinions as to whether they were really such precious marbles. To-day the Elgin Marbles are one of the wonders of the world, and are beyond price.

The value of the discoveries made in Egypt is beyond calculation. Lord Carnarvon's find is estimated at £3,000,000. But the money value means little to these pioneers, who work for the pure love of discovery. The work is very trying, as it is a matter of looking for a needle in a haystack.  
Everywhere is the eternal rubble and sand. Rain hardly ever falls. If you sat and waited for a shower of rain you would have to wait on an average five years! And, after struggling against all these difficulties, your search may lead to naught! All your money, time and labour have been wasted!  
Much has been discovered in Egypt, but there is still a great deal to be unearthed. The total manpower of the Pharaohs was devoted for over a thousand years to building tombs for the rulers. Who knows what fresh glories are awaiting the hand of the excavator to reveal them to an astonished world?

**Venal Husbands Aid Foreign Women Win Access to England**

London.—The many mercenary "bridegrooms" who are willing to

marry alien women for a financial consideration in order to allow them to enter the country, is providing the Home Office with a difficult problem.

Marriage to Britons makes these women British citizens, which is the goal at which they aim. The arrangement is generally that the bridegroom lends his name for the ceremony, receiving from \$50.00 to \$75.00 for his trouble. The couple part at the registry doors, and the wife is thereafter free to travel any place in Great Britain or the dominions without further question.

The Home Office has been able to intervene in many cases, however,

where the bridegrooms have overstepped their legal allowance and married in some instances as many as ten women. In these cases the women have been deported and the men sent to prison for bigamy.

The problem of the nationality of the wife was discussed several times during the last session of Parliament and will come before the Dominion's conference now meeting in London. Here it is expected a final decision will be made as to whether the wife retains her nationality, or takes that of her husband. If the former, the British government will take steps to

ried women to adopt English nationality at once, but prohibiting others from assuming it without going through the usual legal course.

During the year 1921 there were approximately 580 of these "convenient" marriages.
