Coming Reparations Conference May Settle Difficulty

Piracy in Chinese Waters--Parties Lead-
ing in German Elections Favourable to
Dawes' Report--Disabled Canadians
Seed Increased Pensions.

THE GERMAN ELECTIONS.

BERLIN, May 5.
Election returns up to noon to-day
showed the following standing of parties:
Socialists 101; Communists 54;
Democrats 23; Centrists 51; Popu-
lists 40; Nationalists 82; Ultra Na-
tionalists 24; Hanoverians 5; Bavar-
ian Populists 15; Members of Econo-
mic Union 5; Bavarian Peasants 4;
other parties, 8.

A REAL SETTLEMENT IN SIGHT.

LONDON, May 5.
As a result of Prime Minister Mac-
donald's conference with Premier
Theunis of Belgium, at Chequers
Court over the week-end, a new inter-
Allied conference for making the Ex-
perts' reparations plan effective is
closer at hand than has been pre-
viously anticipated, according to the
view of a British official who has had
the opportunity to learn something of
the informal conversations held at the
Premier's official country residence.
The British view is that another mile-
stone has been passed on the long
road towards a reparations settle-
ment and that two more are visible
ahead. These are the French elec-
tions next Sunday and the Belgian
conference with Mussolini at Milan,
May 18. If these are passed success-
fully Premiers MacDonald and Poin-
caré, Theunis and Mussolini, are like-
ly to meet in London or Paris during
June.

A CHINESE PROTEST TO JAPAN.

TOKIO, May 5.
A delegation representing the Chi-
nese Association of Tokio called on
Foreign Minister Matsui to-day and
presented a memorial protesting
against Japanese exclusion of Chi-
nese, declaring that the Chinese ex-
pect the same consideration from Jap-
an as Japan is seeking from the Uni-
ted States. The delegation empha-
sized that although all colored races
are interested in legislation to bar
Asiatics from the United States, it
would be impossible for them to
stand together while Japan maintained
the present restriction on Chinese
immigration.

NFLD. VETERAN DIES IN MON- TEAL.

MONTREAL, May 5.
One who was on active service in
the British navy during the occupa-
tion of Egypt in 1882, and was on
Board H. M. C. Condor, under the late
Lord Charles Beresford when the lit-
tle craft ran under the guns of the
Egyptian forts in Alexandria Harbor
and elicited from the British Admiral
the message "Well done Condor," died
yesterday at his home, 171, Manse St.,
in the person of Henry Cranford Free-
man. Mr. Freeman was born in St.
John's Nfld., 63 years ago and at six-
teen came with his family to Mon-
teal where he had resided ever since,
except for the time he was in the
Navy.

PIRACY IN CHINESE WATERS.

HONG KONG, May 5.
The passenger motor boat Operito,
sailing for Canton from Kowloon,
was seized to-day by pirates who kil-
led the Portuguese skipper and an In-
dian guard, and kidnapped forty pas-
sengers.

A BOUNDARY EXPLOSION.

BELFAST, May 5.
An explosion which was heard for
miles around, occurred on Saturday
night in the grain market at Stri-

bane on the Tyrone-Donagel border.
No one was hurt. Despatches say
the whole town was shaken, the mar-
ket damaged, and telephone wires
thrown down. Belief is that bombs
were used.

DROWNED WHEN MOTOR CAR FALLS IN CANAL.

MONTREAL, May 5.
Oscar Bessner of the city and Ar-
thur Bousquet of Conseau Station,
were drowned when their limousine
skidded and tumbled over the em-
bankment into the Soulanges Canal
here. There were four in the party.
The two in the back seat saved them-
selves by jumping. The body of Bes-
sner was recovered.

SUGAR DROPS.

MONTREAL, May 5.
A reduction of fifteen cents per
hundred pounds on all grades of sug-
ar was announced to-day by the Can-
ada Sugar Refining Company.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH GERMANY DOUBLED.

OTTAWA, May 5.
Canada's trade with Germany dou-
bled in the last fiscal year. In the 12
months ending March, imports from
Germany were \$5,379,377 and increase
over the previous year of \$2,811,325.
Exports to Germany were \$16,153,673,
an increase of \$6,202,769.

DISABLED VETERANS SEEK IN- CREASED PENSIONS.

TORONTO, Ont., May 5.
Representatives from various bran-
ches of the Amputation Associations
of the Great War are converging upon
Ottawa from all parts of Canada for
the third convention of the Associa-
tion, to be held here to-morrow, Wed-
nesday, and Thursday. It promises to
be the largest gathering of war dis-
abled men ever brought to-gether. The
purpose is to induce the Government
to make permanent fifty per cent
bonus on war pensions now existing.

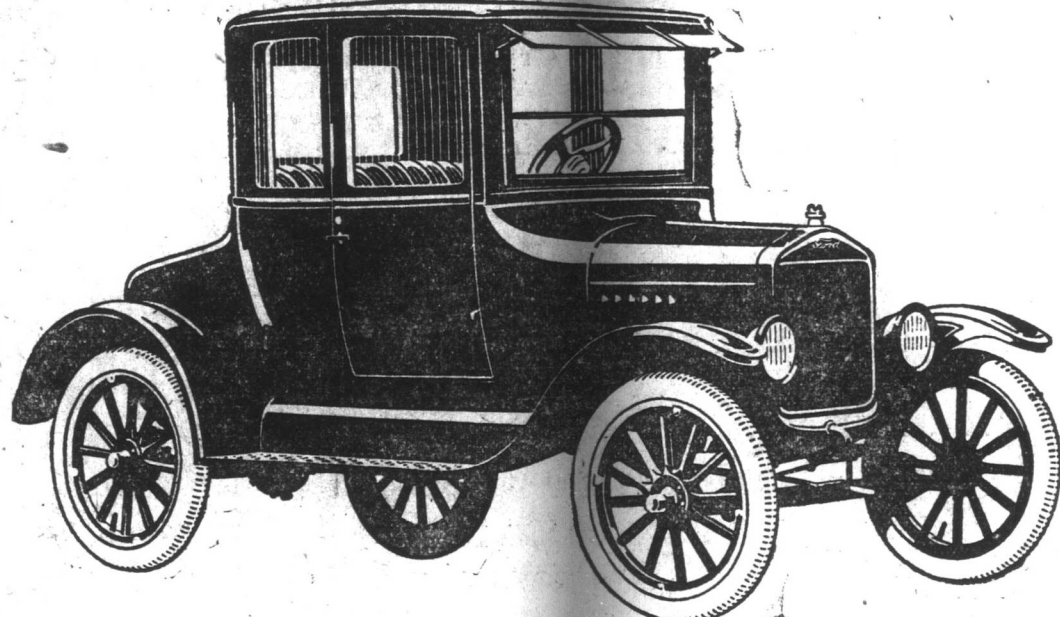

Soviet Fears Espionage

TOKIO, April 24--(Canadian Press)
--Oppressive measures adopted re-
cently by the Russian Soviet au-
thorities are driving many Japanese

residents from Vladivostok, according
to reports from that district. The
Russian officials at Vladivostok are
said to be determined to drive out all
Japanese living there, and so intel-
ligent has been their attitude that the

Japanese government has filed a pro-
test.
The direct cause of the protest was
the action of the Russian authorities
in arresting several Japanese on a
charge of seeking information con-
cerning the Soviet army and fleet.
