Some people think that when doors ar opened or windows raised, that perfect rentilation has been acquired; but there was no belief more foolish. The only ventilation obtained in that way were draughts, which gave persons confined by their duties to these wretched rooms—inhaling a foul, tepid and loathsome atmosphere—colds and illness which were sometimes very serions in their nature. No man liked to be worked to death, but under the circumstances and surroundings he could see no help for it. He had done four weeks' work in three, and in the foul room he had been sitting felt none the better of it. He had been very unwell, but had to go on. He did not complain of this on his own account alone, but there were the jurors, the officers of the Court, and the public, who were much inconvenienced, and suffered from such a place. It was a most contemptible thing that people, who are called upon to do the business and attend to the administration of justice, should have to suffer as they did, when the improvements needed could be added for a small outlay. He knew one Judge who died from illness caused from sitting in the foul air of a particular Court House. While this was bad for the public as well as others, it threw a very great impediment in the way of the transaction of business. The learned Judge's remarks were received with evident favor by those in the room. He concluded by observing that he did not complain of the work, for there were none others who would bear more in the discharge of their duties, but a clear and cool atmosphere should be provided for all who were so confined, as it could be done at a very light expense."

Many persons would be glad to know how to kill an animal without suffering, horses, we use a large sponge, say six inches in diameter, thoroughly saturated with chloroform, which is dropped into a bag large enough to be drawn over the horse's nose. It is not desirable to have the bag "air-tight;" for, if so, suffocation is likely to ensue. In two or three minutes the horse is unconscious, and in eight or ten minutes dead without suffering. For dogs and cats a similar process, using a small sponge and bag; or these canimals, with the saturated sponge, may be put in a box admitting some air, when they soon "go to sleep." Seventy-live cents' worth of chloroform will kill a horse, and twenty-five a dog or cat. If cone saturation of the sponge does not complete the work, repeat it.—Our Dumb Animals.
