THE RESULT SO FAR.—East Peterbore election took place on Tuesday, when Mr. Jas. Hall (Reform) was elected by 146 anjority. This Riding has been redemed from the Conservatives. Up to the present writing the result of the elections in Ontario is an follows:—Government, 64; Opposition, 19; Independent, 3. In Quebec Dr. Robitaille, a member of the late Government has been elected for Bonaventure. This makes the roll-call in that Province, Government, 44; Opposition, 16; Independent, 8.

Severe or Chisholm.—The Hamilton Times has a cutting article on Chisholm, the momber elect for Halton. It says that according to his own representations he should be classed as Ministerialist Opposition and Independent, for he played all the three roles during the contest in Halton. It says:—"Mr. Chisholm will have a freedom of action which few other members of the House can have. His seat may be directly behind that of Mr. Mackenzie, on the left hand of Sir John, or on the cross benches, if, indeed, he should not have a seat set apart for him in all those positions,—so that, whether as Chisholm (Ministerial), Chisholm (Opposition), or Chisholm (Independent), he may always have a place ready for him." It also states that he excelled himself on the temperance question. "He came out specially as a strong advocate of temperance, and so approved himself to the people therein that every tavern keeper in the county (with the exception of less than halfadocan) not only voted for him but distributed unlimited quantities of native Canadian whisked to secure the return of the stern apostle of Prohibition."

Ontario Legislative Assembly.
Toronto, Feb. 3.

The House re-assembled after its recess yesterday, but a very small proportion of the members had returned to town up to the hour of adjournment.

Bills were introduced providing for voting by ballot, for the inspection of railways, and for consolidating the laws relating to the sale of spirituous and fermented liquors.

A vote on account for the current service of the year was taken in Committee of Supply, and the House then went into Committee on the Bill to amend the law respecting escheats. After a discussion, in which the Attorney-General, M. Cameron, and Mr. Hodgins took part, the Committee rose and reported the Bill.

The two Bills introduced by the Attorney-General, to admit of the Incorporation of Charitable Institutions, Benevolent Societies, and other Associations, were then read a second time, and the House adjourned.
