HELL THE PLACE FOR PROFITERS

"Tens of thousands of Canadian
fiddlers are amusing themselves today
as if nothing were happening," said
Rev. William Patterson, D.D., in
Cooke's church, Toronto, recently in
the course of a scathing sermon on
"The Canadian Fiddler." "It is no
harm to play the fiddle," said the
preacher, "in ordinary times, but not
when the world is on fire. Since the
morning stars sang together the world
was never so rocked and shaken, nor
the earth so steeped in human blood.
When the widow and the orphan are
crying out, 'Have ye no pity? Was
there ever any sorrow like unto my
sorrow? Is it nothing to you, all ye
that pass by?'"

"Go to the corner of College and
Young streets and see the crowd of
men there—what have they given?
Men are giving their limbs, some are
giving their reason through shell
shock, thousands are giving their
lives, while other men at home are
saying: 'Let us combine together and
let us see how much we can make
out of this war.'"

"They tell us there is no hell, but
if there is not there ought to be.
Where will these profiteers go if there
is no hell? These magnificent men
who preside over the food trusts, who
are very generous and will give thou-
sands to the church, while men are
lying by thousands on the battlefield,
these men are cornering foodstuffs.
If these men are fit for heaven, then
you will have to cut the fifteenth
Psalm out of the Book."

Since the beginning of the year the
enlistment in Canada reached hardly
50,000, and the wastage was over
90,000, which justifies a change in the
method of getting soldiers.

The Ottawa newspapermen having
made all possible guesses about the
construction of the cabinet or changes
in the cabinet, are now filling up
their space by repeating the guesses
a second time.

JUSTICE FOR SWEDEN
Sweden, or rather the Swedish govern-
ment, has been the secret ally of
Germany since the beginning of the
war. Its co-operation has been two-
fold. It has acted as an adjunct to
the world-wide spy system maintained
by the Berlin foreign office and it
has been the medium of transfer for
millions of tons of food and military
supplies from neutral and even allied
territory to needy Germany.

Now retribution has overtaken
those guilty of this treachery. The
United States has put an embargo
on cipher cable dispatches, wheat,
metals and other war supplies. Eng-
land supplements the United States
action with a proclamation forbidding
the transmission to Sweden,
Norway, Denmark and the Nether-
lands of all commodities except
printed matter, an ironic touch which
must make the penal measure all the
harder to bear.

The blow will be a deadly one to
Germany. Of course, it will not
cause starvation in Sweden. It will
simply compel the Swedes to keep
their foodstuffs at home. Germany
will incur the resulting privation,
but the only Swedes to suffer will
be the profiteers, for whom nobody
has any sympathy, and the pro-Ger-
man king and queen and court, who
deserve, in fact, the fate of the czar
for their toadyism to Germany and
their treachery to the Swedish people
and the allies.

Bit by bit, justice and right are as-
serting themselves in the war.

Even the Ratepayers' association,
usually not lacking in courage and
originality, seems unusually coy about
suggesting the names of candidates
for aldermen.

Politicians who begin by assum-
ing that they are more loyal than
their opponents, or that their oppo-
nents are disloyal, are starting on
a wrong foundation entirely. That
sort of thing, however loudly pro-
claimed, does not impress any person
somewhat.

GERMANY'S SEVENTH LOAN

The campaign for Germany's sev-
enth war loan opened at the Reichs-
bank on September 19 and will close
on October 18. The government pro-
claims in many advertisements that
"We can, must and shall succeed,
else we encourage England to go on
fighting." The Krupps have sub-
scribed for 50,000,000 marks, but sub-
scriptions are sought mostly among
industrial owners and farmers, who are
supposed to have ready cash. Banks
and insurance companies offer in-
dicements to investors of 100 marks,
10 per cent cash and the remainder
by installments running in some cases
for twenty years! The mustard seed
would survive beside the disciplined
German faith. Abuse of President
Wilson is a feature of the placards.
Recent advices from persons not
of German nationality who are con-
sidered to be familiar with actual
financial conditions within that sorely
misgoverned empire have lately re-
marked upon the imminency of this
latest loan, saying that it would
probably prove to be the last burden
which would precipitate the general
conditions of bankruptcy which can
scarcely be concealed much longer
from Germans in Germany. Out-
siders have considered Germany bank-
rupt for a year past; the "pyramid-
ing of hypotecations" is likely to
topple at any moment.

And now a P.E.I. member of parlia-
ment has been placed in charge of
the R.N.W.M.F. That is the Borden
government's idea of reform in party
patronage and civil service efficiency.

If the Calgary aldermen, sitting in
their council, call to their assistance
all the men whom they have threat-
ened to call, the financial stand-
ing of the city will have been solved.

The rush of Conservative members
of parliament to life offices in the
civil service and the senate is a
humiliating spectacle at this time,
when all public men are expected to
be considering public welfare and
nothing else.

DRAFTED MEN WILL START SERVICE ON DECEMBER TENTH

But Must Report for Service or Claim Exemption by November 10

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The first men drafted
under the Military Service Act will
not actually be called to the colors till
December 10. The date has been fixed
to place all men called on an absolute
basis of equality. By then all exemp-
tion tribunals must have their work
completed, and the man who applies
for exemption will thus gain no time
as compared with the man who reports
for service without making any such
claim. There will be no possibility of
claiming exemption for the purpose of
delay.

The proclamation which will be pub-
lished broadcast on Saturday calling
out the first class of men provides that:

Every man within the class called
out must either report for service or
claim exemption on or before Novem-
ber 10.

Exemption tribunals will begin their
work on November 8 and must com-
plete it by December 10, which is the
earliest date on which any man will
actually be called to the colors.

Published With Proclamation
Regulations which will be published
concurrently with the proclamation
contain some stringent provisions. Se-
vere penalties are provided for bribery
or attempted bribery. Any person
found guilty of attempting to bribe any
member of an exemption tribunal,
medical board or military representa-
tive will be liable to a term of impris-
onment not exceeding five years and
not less than one year. Imprisonment
is also provided for those who are
guilty of any offence under the
proclamation.

There are also regulations of special
importance to employers. In certain
quarters the fear has been expressed
that an unscrupulous employer might
attempt to take advantage of the act
to bring down wages, or as similarly,
an employer might offer to work for
less wages—conditionally on the em-
ployer claiming exemption for the man.
In the regulations any such action will
be an offence punishable by a fine not
exceeding \$1,000 nor less than \$100 or
imprisonment not to exceed six months.
Any employer who enters into any
agreement with an employe providing
for any reduction of an employe's sal-
ary or wages, or for the alteration of
any condition of employment in consid-
eration of the employe exercising or
refraining from exercising his right to
claim exemption from military service
shall be liable to a fine not exceeding
\$1,000 nor less than \$100, or to impris-
onment not to exceed six months.

ANOTHER PEACE OFFER

Central Allies Decide to Make Another Advance.

Amsterdam, Oct. 9.—Germany and
Austria-Hungary have agreed to make
another peace offer to the allies, the
Deutsche Tages Zeitung of Berlin,
says it learns on good authority. The
offer will have as its basis no terri-
torial aggrandisement, the surrender
of Belgium and French territory, the
renunciation of positive territorial ac-
quisitions for payments in money and
no indemnity or neither side.
