PATERSON ANARCHISTS MEET. Held a Meeting When They Endorsed

the Killing of King Humbert. New York, Aug. 1 .-- There was a meeting of Anarchists in Paterson, N. J., Monday night at which the killing of King Humbert was en-dorsed. A reporter who sought admittance was welcomed, as it was said that these Anarchists wanted the whole world to know their sentiments.

The principal speaker at the meet-The principal speaker at the meeting was Ernesta Cravella, 21 years of age. In the course of an impassioned address he said: "We are members of the group of Anarchists to which Bressi belonged. He is a martyr. He has done what we would have him do. It was not our instruction to Bressi to kill but he nstruction to Bressi to kill, but he has done what he knew to be right, and we will sustain him and give him our sympathy. Humbert was a monarch, and all monarchs, accord-

ng to our vows, must die. "Let Nicholas of Russia tremble and let the new King of Italy pre-pare for death. They are inhuman. It is a republic that we want, and it is a republic that the Anarchists in every country will have."

British Court in Mourning. London, Aug. 2 .- The Gazette orders the court, in mourning for King Humbert, from Aug. 2 to Aug. 23, and for the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha from Aug. 2 to Sept. 13.

Canadian Flag Half Masted.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.—A cablegram from Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, addressed to Lord Minto, was received at the Governor General's office yesterday, and sent to the Militia Department. In it Mr. Chamberlain asks that the ensign shall be flown at half mast from the Parlia-ment and other public buildings in Canada, ia honor of the memory of Canada, ia honor of the memory of the late King Humbert, and that it shall be so flown until after the

Plague of Civilization.

London, Aug. 1.—Moving an address to the Queen with reference to the assassination of King Humbert of Italy, the Premier, Lord Salisbury, in the House of Lords yesterday re-called that the last half of the cen-tury had seen the assassination of three Presidents of republics and two monarchs. 'It was a fearful thing,' Lord Salisbury said, 'to contemplate this depth of human yilbeneath the smiling surface of Which threatened the de tines of society in the early future."

It was nothing but that morbid thirst for notoriety which is the plague and curse of modern civiliza-tions and had time and again led men to the commission of the foul-est crimes. It threatened the very existence of society if it could not be arrested.

King Starts For Rome. Reggio Di Galabria, Aug. 1.—King Victor Emmanuel III. arrived here at noon yesterday aboard his yacht, pre-ceded by a torpedo boat, which had been sent in search of him. The king started for Rome at 1 o'clock a.m.

Bressi a Cyric. Monza, Aug. 1.—Bressi maintains an air of the utmost cynicism. In the course of his examination he declared himself to be a revolutionary anarchist, and said he was ready to resume operations if he were released.

By rallying with unshakable loyalty around his august. unshakable loyalty around his august successor Italians will prove by their deeds that their institutions do not die."

The King was so pleased with his welcome at Monza and felt so safe that he turned to his aide and said: "I'd like to return afoot," but he was dissuaded.
