

Organizer R. Cooper organized one of the
most promising camps yet started for the
Canadian Order of Woodmen in the town

Board of Works.

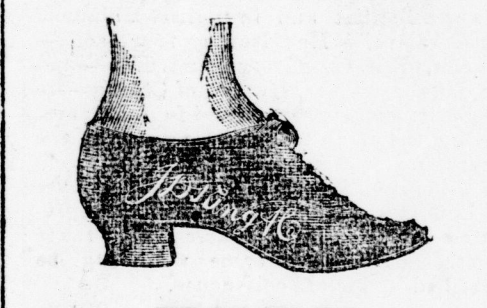
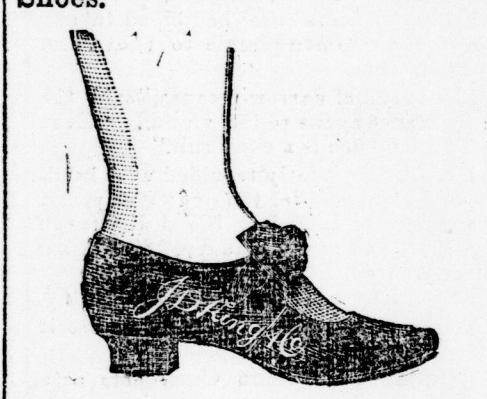
A large amount of business was trans-
acted at last evening's meeting of No. 2
committee. The first petition read was
from Thos. H. Warren asking that the
band of this season's open air concerts. It
was filed. A letter was read from the
Canadian General Electric Company
stating the cost of electric service on the
stone crusher. Mrs. Hart sent in a
petition to have John street opened up.
The engineer stated that the cost would be

that this matter be left to the chairman,
the engineer and the park ranger to report
on it. The weekly pay sheet, amounting
to \$396.26, passed. In the matter of the
stone crusher, it was moved that the
engineer look over the specifications as to
repairing "Jumbo," or getting a new
crusher. The members present were Chair-
man Thomas Jones, Secretary J. Bell, Alds.
Dreaney, Taylor, Garratt and Shaw,
Engineer Graydon and Mayor Essery.

The Jubilee Singers.

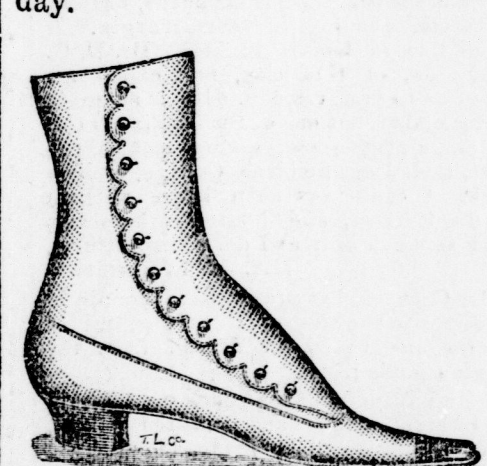
South Londoners to the number of about

Hanged With a Skein of Yarn.

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., May 3.—Mrs. Mary
Ann Rulison, mother of Dr. C. M. Rulison,
was found hanging from a skein of yarn at-
tached to the door in her bedroom this
morning. She was 78 years old.

The Marblehead is a Flyer.

NEW YORK, May 3.—The cruiser Mar-
blehead, which has been on a trial trip for
two days, returned to-day. Estimated by
a patent log she made for two hours 34.6
knots, or at the rate of 17.6 knots an hour.
Some of the board thought this was hardly
possible, and doubted the correctness of
the log.

Steamer Burned.

COLLINGWOOD, Ont., May 3.—News
reached here this morning of the destruc-
tion of the steamer Truant by fire, and re-
port says she was burned to the water's
edge. She ran ashore on Burnt Island,
Georgian Bay, and in an endeavor to take
her off the beach she caught fire. She was owned by
Herbert Cleland, of this town, and insured
for \$2,400. As far as is known no person
was injured.

Vaccinate and Re-vaccinate.

TORONTO, May 3.—The Provincial Board
of Health to-day passed a resolution to the
effect that in view of the prevalence of
smallpox in the neighboring States of the
union local boards of health should under
the Vaccination Act still more actively
than heretofore prosecute the work of
vaccination and re-vaccination by providing
stations for systematic public vaccination
and by keeping fresh vaccine always on
hand for the convenience of practicing
physicians.

What Different Eyes Indicate.

The long, almond-shaped eye with thick
eyelids covering nearly half of the pupil,
when taken in connection with the full
brow, is indicative of genius, and is often
found in artists, literary and scientific men.
It is the eye of talent or impressibility.
The large, open, transparent eye, of what-
ever color, is indicative of elegance of taste,
refinement, of wit, of intelligence. Weakly
marked eyebrows indicate a feeble consti-
tution and a tendency to melancholia. Deep
sunken eyes are selfish, while eyes in
which the whole iris shows indicates erratis-
m if not lunacy. Round eyes are
indicative of innocence; strongly protuber-
ant eyes of weakness of both mind and
body. Eyes small and close together
typify cunning, while those far apart and
open indicate frankness. The normal dis-
tance between the eye is the width of one
eye; a distance greater or less than this
indicates the character supposed to be
symbolized. Sharp angles, turning down
at the corners of the eye, are seen in per-
sons of acute judgment and penetration.
Well-opened steady eyes belong to the
sincere; wide staring eyes to the imper-
tent. Gray eyes are supposed to be the
strongest, blue the weakest, while large
eyes are most subject to the defect known
