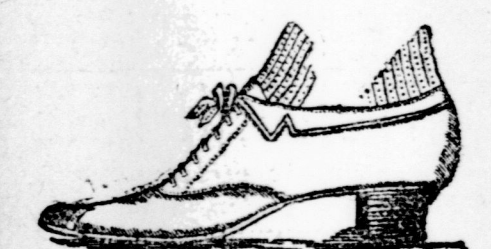

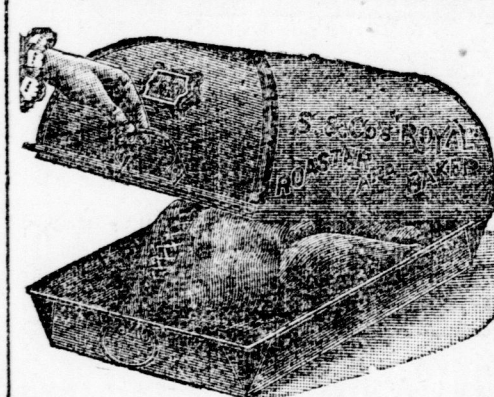

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mrs. Rae, Winnipeg, is visiting in this
city.—Mr. R. C. Struthers has returned from a
purchasing trip in Britain.—Rev. Ira Smith is to preach in the
Sarnia Baptist Church on Sunday next.—The high school entrance examinations
will be held here on June 23, 24, and 25.—The International Walt Whitman Soci-
ety was organized in New York yester-
day.—To A. S. London—"The Devil's Aue-
tion" appeared last in London on March 5,
1887.—The induction of Rev. James Ballan-
tine, city, to the pastorate of Knox
Church, Ottawa, takes place Monday,
June 11.—Owing to the limited supply of coal,
two trains on the Glenora-Kingscourt
branch of the G. T. R. have been canceled
temporarily.—Compositors and proofreaders get
much blame for the occasional errors they
make and little praise for the many blunders
they rectify.—Rev. Dr. Alex. Sutherland, missionary
secretary of the Methodist Church, strongly
opposes Mr. Meredith's view that a second
pictorial on prohibition should be taken.—Mr. Wm. White, G. T. R. dispatcher,
this city, has been attending the Railway
Telegraphers' convention at Denver, Col.,
the past ten days. On Wednesday he was
elected grand inside sentinel.—A flash of lightning killed five chickens
and smashed the roof of Mr. O'Hagan's
barn, corner of Victoria and Maitland
streets, on Wednesday. Mr. O'Hagan and
his son had just left the place.—The members of the London Amateur
Opera Company who produced "The Grand
Duchess" spent a social evening together
in the Duffield block last night. There
was a quiet little dance, refreshments and
a good programme.—The Women's Christian Association
desire to thank the members of the hospi-
tal trust for their kindness in offering to
give for the use of the Home for Incurables
anything in the way of house furnishings
not at present required in the hospital.—Advertising is the sluice which leads

gaged to play the large pipe organ in St.
James' Church, London, at a large salary.—Miss Armstrong has been organist for
the last two months, but has never been
engaged as regular organist.—[Alvinston
Free Press.]—Rev. Dr. Ryckman, of Ottawa, formerly
of this city, against whom a charge of
untruthfulness was entered at the meeting
of the conference at Kingston, has been
unanimously exonerated from the charge.The doctor is the popular nominee for
president of the conference.—After a considerable period of repose
the fire brigade were called out twice last
evening. The first summons was to the
Metropolitan Hotel, where an obstreperous
chimey was smoking out the upper rooms.The fire was put out with very little dam-
age. Shortly afterwards there was an-
other call to a barn at Mr. John Stephen-
son's, 129 Maple street, where two little
boys had been indulging in that old time
trick of playing with matches in the hay.When the firemen got through there was
considerable burnt hay and two badly
scared boys. The damage was slight.—Miss Deborah, of Windsor, was to
have been a candidate for communion at
All-Saints Church, Windsor, last Sunday
afternoon. Three weeks ago she was taken
ill with typhoid fever, and for a time was
not expected to live. In her delirium she
constantly expressed regret that she had
not been confirmed. When she began to
grow better she hoped and prayed that she
might recover in time to join with the
class. Saturday she tried to sit up to show
that she was strong enough to make the
attempt. The matter reached the ears of
the Bishop of Huron, and he took his con-
firmation robes and went to the bedside of
the unfortunate young woman, where the
ceremony was performed.

Marter Gives Meredith Away.

Board of Works.

The board of works met last night, and
the members were in a jovial mood after
their little trip to stone crushers. As the
council went to hear the leader of the
Opposition instead of attending to business
the other night, there was very little for
the committee to do except pass accounts,
which accumulate whether the council
meets or not. Mrs. Crawford was given
permission to lay down a "dish-water"
drain from her house at the corner of Pall
Mall and Waterloo streets, to Carling's
Creek, providing the work is done to the
satisfaction of the engineer. E. J. Orndorf
was given the contract for the erection of the
cistern, shed and fence in Victoria Park, to
cost \$252. The pay roll amounted to
\$392 56, of which \$100 25 is chargeable to
"Roads." The matter of band concerts
was laid over until warmer weather, with
a view also of making the concerts last un-
til along in September. The Seventh, it is
understood, will give a free concert on
their own responsibility to-night. The
committee so far has spent \$12,785 60 of
their appropriation of \$43,880. On motion

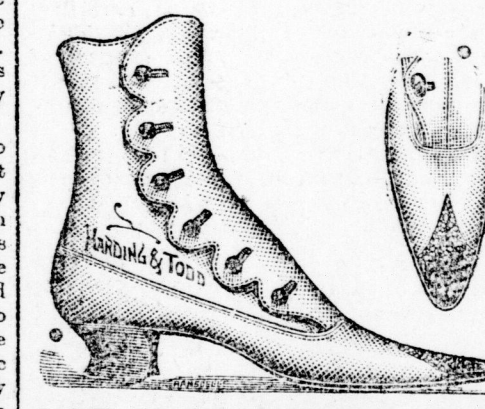
