Realing, Stockport (two seats), Great Grimby and Greenock (Scotland) carried by opponents of Gladstone in the elections of Isso and 1886, now return Liberals—6.

Rochester, York and Nottingham, Liberals seats, have been won by Conservatives.

This leaves a gain so far for the Liberals of eleven.
