BRANT.
At the initial meeting of the Brantford Temperance Fair Board, the prize list for 1893 was revised. Everything points to a most successful show on Sept. 27, 28 and 29.

The Brantford temperance party is getting well organized for the coming plebiscite. Meetings are held every Friday evening, and the city is being divided into wards.

David Meakin, of Colchester South, has married a daughter who has parted from her husband, their two children being taken to raise by Mr. Meakin. Report has it that Mr. Meakin has ill-treated the children, and Isaac Lair has laid information charging him with trying to get rid of one of the children by drowning and the other by hanging. The case was before John Richmond Saturday, and was adjourned for a few days.

ELGIN.
An inquest will be held in connection with the death of Frank Sherman, the section foreman at Yarmouth killed in the recent M. C. R. accident.

On Saturday afternoon Special Constable Hopkins at St. Thomas showed a man whom he suspected of giving liquor to Indians. The man after going east returned and went down Elgin street, where he was seen to hand a parcel to Henry Styles, an Indian. The constable went up and found it to be a bottle of whisky. He then arrested the white man, Charles Wedge, of Sheddin. At the police court he was fined \$50 and costs for three months in jail.

HURON.
Capt. Moore, of the steamship City of Windsor, has brought intelligence regarding the portion of a ship recently cast ashore at Walkerton, which appears to be one body was found in the wreck instead of three, as was reported. The wreck is a piece of the cabin roof about six feet square, painted olive green. On the body was a black coat and vest, black trousers, pair of overalls, yellow rubber boots and black coat, new rubber boots, pair gray cotton socks, gray underclothing. He was about 6 feet in height and between 30 and 35 years of age. The body was found about fourteen miles from Walkerton.

The large barns on the farm belonging to W. J. Dickson, on the gravel road near Walton, were burned to the ground on Sunday night, together with over 60 tons of hay, a quantity of grain and some valuable farm implements. The hay crop had just been harvested. The loss will be \$5,000, on which there is an insurance of \$1,200 on buildings and an equal amount on contents.

During a game of tennis the other day at the residence of W. H. Martin, of Chatham, Alfred Kell, medical student, removed his coat and laid it upon the front door. Shortly after, while the party were at luncheon, a woman, giving the name of Ashton, came to require for work. After she had gone a pocket watch which appeared to have rolled out of the coat pocket was missing. It contained two hospital tickets, worth about \$100 to Mr. Kell but of no value to anyone else, a check for \$20 and about a dollar in change. The police were set on her track, but she had levanted.

OXFORD.
Andrew T. Beatty, head accountant with Modley Bros. wholesale druggists, of St. Louis, Mo., died Saturday at his home in Knoxville, where he had come to visit. The cause of his death was lung trouble, which he contracted a year ago.

Chief Northgraves, of Ingersoll, made a clever capture of a couple of jewelry thieves Friday. He received word from Chief Fawcett, of St. Thomas, that a burglary had taken place at Union, in which three gold rings, two gold watches, and a pair of gold eyeglasses were stolen. Northgraves located the guilty parties and succeeded in recovering the stolen articles.

John Pellow, for a number of years a resident of Ingersoll and a well-known figure around the Manitowish House, died Friday night at the residence of his brother, Joseph Pellow, West Oxford. Deceased was in his 67th year.

WALKED ALL THE WAY.

Mr. Lucile Rodney and Her Party Tramp from Galveston to Chicago.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Mrs. Lucile Rodney, accompanied by her husband, G. B. Rodney and W. W. Holliday, arrived in Chicago yesterday afternoon from Galveston, Texas, having walked the entire distance. The trip was made for a wager of \$5,000 and sundry considerations.

A FORGER FOR \$150,000.
The Crooked Transactions of a New York Bookbinder.

New York, July 31.—Judge Bookbinder, in the Court of Common Pleas, granted orders that the summons in two actions brought against James Grange, the bookbinder of No. 66 and 68 Duane street, who made an assignment several weeks ago and absconded, having withdrawn large sums of money and uttered forged paper to the amount of upward of \$150,000, be served upon him by publication.

One suit is brought by Lawrence, Frazier & Co., bankers and brokers, to recover \$8,439 on forged checks, notes and drafts issued by Grange. The other action is by Charles Fraser and Henry G. Marshall, to recover \$7,000 on forged checks.

Several creditors have brought suits against Grange, one of them being to recover \$87,000 on forged paper.

TWO DARING ROBBERIES.
Thieves Get Away with Over \$5,000 Worth of Jewelry and Diamonds.

CHICAGO, July 31.—One of the most daring robberies ever attempted in the city was committed at the residence of Mrs. R. Ammon Saturday afternoon in broad daylight. The thieves, after binding and gagging Mrs. Ammon, succeeded in robbing her of her diamonds and a gold watch, the whole valued at \$2,000, and made good their escape. Well-dressed men were admitted to the house about 3 o'clock and one of them displayed a detective's badge and said that he was searching for a thief whom he suspected to be a friend of Mrs. Ammon's servant and to be hiding in the girl's room. While Mrs. Ammon was showing the supposed detectives upstairs one grasped her by the throat and putting a revolver to her throat threatened her with instant death if she made an outcry. At the same instant the other man turned a handkerchief in her mouth, and taking a rope from his pocket bound her hands and feet. They then placed her on the bed and robbed her of her jewelry. She wore two diamond rings and her diamond eardrums, and they tore and lacerated the woman's arms in pulling them out. The thieves then ransacked the drawers of a dresser and found other jewelry and then took their departure, leaving Mrs. Ammon bound and gagged. The most startling theory in connection with the robbery is that the thieves were police officers.

May Seymour, the keeper of a disreputable house, was robbed of a casket containing \$3,500 worth of diamonds the same night.

Fell Dead Beating His Wife.
PHILADELPHIA, July 31.—Wm. Washington, recently a resident of this city, but now of York, Pa., met death under peculiar circumstances. He became aggravated at his wife, and while beating her he fell dead.

Sir John Abbott's Condition.
MONTREAL, July 31.—Sir John Abbott's health is not causing anxiety to his family. Sir John remains a good deal of the time in his bed, not because he feels ill, but because the reclining position affords him more comfort.

Had a Rattler Hooked in His Trousers.
ASHLAND, Pa., July 31.—A son of David McKelvey, residing at Rocktown, while running through the woods near his home, was attacked by a rattlesnake which he had trod upon. The snake fastened its fangs to the boy's pantaloons and was unable to withdraw them. The frightened boy started home at breakneck speed, dragging the snake with him, where it was killed. The lad was not hurt.

North Fight Back.
CHICAGO, July 31.—Henry Bertrand Nemitz intends to bring an action against Arnold Hoinger, the Swiss consul, and M. Perrenaud, the Swiss commissioner-general at the World's Fair, for defamation of character. Nemitz claims he has suffered damages to the amount of \$25,000 because Hoinger and Perrenaud circulated reports that he had embezzled certain sums of money from the Swiss exhibitors. Consul Hoinger procured the arrest of Nemitz in Toronto on the charge of larceny, and the warrant issued will form the basis of the allegations of the Swiss agent.

Liquor Dealers in Politics.
CINCINNATI, O., July 31.—The Ohio State League of Liquor Dealers will enter politics as an organization. This important announcement was made at the close of the quarterly session Friday. It is the purpose of the League of Dealers to formulate and express their views upon certain questions affecting the liquor interests, and failing, they will be voted against.

It was given out that a resolution was adopted to the effect that the league will support only those candidates entertaining "liberal views." This is intended to embrace the repeal of the Adair law, which provides for a list of habitual drunkards and makes it an offense to sell liquor to them. It covers also the repeal of the Sunday closing law. Both these laws the league interests consider fantastical, and they think that they should be repealed.

An officer of the league makes the statement that the members have no objection to a proper restriction or a regulation that will put out of existence the low-class saloons, which cast approbrium upon the entire trade. He gave out the further information that the liquor interest would not oppose a modified Sunday law, or one giving communities local option. It is their argument that public sentiment in all the large cities favor open saloons on Sunday, and they do not want those members of the Legislature who represent villages and townships to dictate what the cities shall do. They do not object to a law prohibiting the sale of liquor to minors, but demand that the minor, as well as the saloon-keeper be punished as attempting a fraud.

The league's interest in Senator Ives, of the liquor district, because he voted to suit the liquor interests in the last Assembly, is the subject of much discussion. The annual meeting will be held in this city Oct. 9.
