English ships were sent to demand its surrender and that the Chinese evacuate the place. The British then hoisted their flag, and the other flagships thereupon went thither and put up their respective flags over the forts."

Washington, Oct. 3.-A feeling of buoyant optimism prevails among officials here today relative to the Chinese troubles that warrants the belief in the existence of a sound foundation, based on recent developments, in pending negotiations. It is evidently the conviction, officially that a rapprochement among the powers is near at

AMERICANS NOT IN IT.

The allies have been advised that the authorities of Shan Hai Kwan have been instructed to capitulate. St. Petersburg, Oct. 3.-The Russian general staff has received a dispatch dealing with the operations north of old Niu Chwang, which says that Gen. Fleischer's division of 6,000 men, with artillery, engaged the Chinese on a vast plain covered with high grass.

The Russians lost two officers killed and 18 men wounded. According to the same advices Colonel Artamanoff, while reconnoitering with two squadrons of cavalry, came into touch with 14,000 disciplined Chinese. These Gen. Fleischer is expected to re-engage.

The Russians remaining in Pekin are two battalions of infantry and a battery of artillery Col. Tro manding. They will hold the summer palace and the Machiapo Railway terminus.

SUITS THE GERMAN PRESS. Berlin, Oct. 4.—The newspapers here unanimously applaud Emperor William's championship of the combined interests of civilization and Christianity, as contained in his reply to the message of the Emperor of China. At the same time the commentators find in his majesty's telegram a new bridge upon which the Chinese authorities may approach the demands of the allied powers. The reply, generally, is regarded as conciliatory. The National Zeitung thinks it affords "an indisputable
