FAIR, FOLLOWED BY RAIN.

Toronto, March 21—11 p. m.—The high pressure and fair, colder weather continue over the Northwest. The low pressure area over the upper lakes last night is in the neighborhood of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and it has caused local falls of sleet or rain from the lakes eastward, being followed by an increase of pressure over Ontario and low temperatures. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 48°—54°; Calgary, 2°—14°; Edmonton, 2°—20°; Battleford, 22° below—zero; Qu'Appelle, 12° below—6°; Winnipeg, 20° below—6°; Port Arthur, 4°—18°; Toronto, 35°—40°; Kingston, 34°—40°; Montreal, 29°—40°; Quebec, 16°—35°; Halifax, 15°—26°.

Toronto, March 22—1 a. m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Wind, becoming easterly; fair to cloudy weather, followed by rain or sleet.

Mr. Richard Thompson, of Piccadilly street, has resigned as a director of the Ontario Investment Association.

Mr. James Crawford has been re-appointed inspector of the Humane Society for the next quarter, his work having been very satisfactory.

Wm. Corbett, jun., Ridout street, lost two fingers and a thumb in one of the presses at McClary's foundry on Tuesday. Dr. Moore dressed the injuries.

As directed by the council, Mayor Egan has signed the petition issued by the Dominion Alliance asking for a plebiscite on prohibition in the Province.

A young man named John Grayson received a very painful injury to his hand by a piece of boiler plate falling on it at Leonard's boiler shop this morning.

Mr. Frank C. Green, of San Francisco, Cal., has arrived home after an absence of two years. He is looking well, and the Pacific coast appears to agree with him.

Mr. J. F. Topping, who has been connected with Geo. Caldwell, Woodstock, for a number of years, has accepted a position with Messrs. Spittal, Burn & Gentleman in the carpet department.

Mr. S. Mitchell, a G. T. R. brakeman, has been badly injured. It is reported that he was run over by a train. It is a long-felt want. It is claimed it will save railway companies thousands of dollars.

Mr. Robert C. Mitchell, who has been operator in the C. P. R. telegraph office here for some time, has been promoted to a similar position in the Toronto office. His friends here will be pleased to hear of his success.

In High Court of Justice yesterday: Wilkins vs. Young.—P. McPhillips, for the plaintiff, moved to obtain an injunction granted by the local judge at London. Injunction continued till the trial, which is to be expedited.

Count Forest Queen, A. O. E., received a telegraph dispatch from Montreal last evening informing them that their application for an excursion to Windsor and Detroit on the 24th of May was agreeable to the Grand Trunk officials.

The special services in the First Congregational Church, conducted by the Rev. A. W. Main, are proving most interesting and very successful. The attendance is growing larger every night. The services will be continued every night this week.

Those who have a taste for plays, the scenes of which are laid in Ireland, will find much to enjoy in "My Calleen," which will be seen at the Opera House to-night. It is the composition of James A. Herne, author of "Hearts of Oak." As the central character in this breezy four-act comedy drama, Mr. Farrell, the star, displays the Irish brightness.

There was a large attendance at St. Andrew's Church last night, when Rev. Dr. Sexton, of New York, lectured on "Primer man; his origin, antiquity and primitive condition." The lecturer handled his subject in a clear and logical manner, and for about an hour and a half sustained the rare attention of his audience. The pastor, Rev. J. A. Murray, occupied the chair.

Miss Nora Clench, the Canadian violinist, played at a fashionable "At Home" on the 8th inst. at the residence of Mrs. Frank Lawson, formerly Lady Benedict, in London. Miss Clench, a Miss Clench, an artist, was Signor Piatto, the renowned violinist, and Miss Liza Lehman, vocalist. Signor Piatto was much impressed by the fair Canadian's playing, and complimented her highly. On the 23rd inst. Miss Clench will play at a concert at which Mr. Santley is to sing. Miss Clench's friends in Canada will no doubt be glad to hear of her success in London.

An Honest Boy.

Last evening a lady advertised having lost her purse containing nearly \$30 in cash. She called at the ADVERTISER Office at 9 p. m. to say that a boy named John Forcer, living on Palace street, had found it and returned it to her, having seen the advertisement in this paper. He was generously rewarded with \$5 from the owner.

A Sullivanistic Scene.

Patrick Sullivan, of London West, got drunk yesterday afternoon and repaired to Gard's factory, taking an axe with him. Before he could be stopped he had entirely demolished the stove, and then he whipped out a large knife and started after the employees, who were losing no time in seeking escape. Sullivan had the factory to himself until Village Constable Ward appeared on the scene and arrested him. The prisoner was taken before Squire Lacey and remanded until to-day. It is not known whether Sullivan was merely drunk or insane.

A New Crusade.

The recent convention of the Methodist Epworth League, Endeavor societies, and other Young People's associations, initiated a strong advance movement on temperance lines. It arranged for a close alliance with the Young People's associations of all the churches for organizing a definite "plan of campaign" to promote, first, abstinence for the individual, then local prohibition for village, town and county, and as soon as practicable, for the whole Dominion. If the strength and enthusiasm of these numerous societies be thrown into such an effort, it may do much to unify the moral forces

of the country in a movement against what is deemed to be one of the greatest social evils of our time. Persons interested in the subject may write to Rev. Dr. Withrow, Toronto, general secretary of the Epworth League in Canada.

In South Middlesex.

Trebilcock's Hall was stiflingly packed at the final meeting of the present campaign last night. The speakers were Candidate Boston, Charles S. Hyman and Mr. E. R. Cameron. Logical and convincing addresses were delivered by each speaker, and the crowd by its applause, showed its hearty accord with the principles laid down. Although both sides were invited, no one stood up to favor Mr. Gray's candidature. At the close hearty cheers were given for the Liberal candidate and for the Queen.

A Female Fraud.

Last fall a number of citizens interested in Humane Society work were approached by a lady who claimed to be canvassing for the Humane World, a Chicago publication devoted to Humane Society work. The woman was of good appearance and a plausible talker, and in a short time had most of the leading members of the society interested in her mission. She secured a large number of \$1.50 subscriptions, and the subscribers received a couple editions of a "boiler plate" magazine, and then it ceased to come altogether. It is claimed that the woman, who appeared to have excellent credentials, has collected about \$2,000 in Canada and the United States. A Chicago paper denounces her as a fraud.

St. Andrew's Society.

The quarterly meeting of St. Andrew's Society was held last night, President Robt. Reid in the chair. A committee composed of the president, the treasurer, Mr. J. W. Jones, and Mr. Tyler, chairman of the relief committee, were appointed delegates to the Organized Charities meeting. It was resolved to hold an "At Home" in Somerset Hall on Tuesday, April 18, when all the members and their friends will be invited. Messrs. R. Reid, James McSweeney, James Kilgour, A. J. W. Jones, R. K. Cowan, J. D. Clarke, Arch. Sharp, William Gall and A. P. Templeton were appointed a committee to carry out necessary arrangements. An invitation was received from the Caledonian Society of Chicago to participate in the week's Highland games during the last week of July next at the World's Fair. The invitation was filed. Mr. Kilgour gave notice of motion for the appointment of a committee to aid in securing the active co-operation of Scotsmen and their descendants who are not members.

A Runaway Youth.

A telegram was received last evening by the police here telling them to arrest a young lad about 17 years of age, who had skipped out from Innerkip with about \$70 of his employer's money. At that place he purchased an exchange ticket for Chicago, and arriving in this city he obtained a through ticket. This occurred immediately on arrival of the 7 o'clock C. P. R. train. From the agent he learned that the ticket was good up to to-morrow night. At Chatham a telegram awaited the conductor of the train to arrest the youth, but the answer came back that he had not boarded the train, leaving London. The lad formerly lived here and has numerous friends if not relatives. The telegram did not state the name of either the runaway or his employer. Detectives Ryder and Nickle are watching for him but so far have found no trace of him.

PREPARING THE ESTIMATES.

No. 2 of the Educational Board Start But Do Not Finish—Hon. G. W. Ross Pleasant Surprise.

No. 2 committee of the Board of Education met last night with a view of preparing estimates for the ensuing year. They could not finish, however, owing to the absence of several members. They prepared the estimates as far as \$15,600.

Principal Merchant, of the Collegiate Institute, was anxious to know whether there was going to be a lot of July demonstration this year. On receiving Mr. Dewar's answer in the affirmative, Mr. Merchant continued: "Because if you are you had better make some estimate for that purpose, and not charge it all against the Institute. Four hundred dollars was charged against us last year, and all I had to show for it was a small badge."

Trustee Anderson gave it as his opinion that the affair was too costly. Mr. Dewar informed him that the flags that were printed the last year could and would be used again this year, thus making quite a saving. "But you should have seen the fun this afternoon," continued Mr. Dewar, who was still talking flags. "You know, Hon. Geo. W. Ross, Minister of Education, visited the Simcoe street school with us to-day. Of course the children sang that patriotic song, 'Hurrah for the Maple Leaf.' Mr. Ross, who was walking up and down the aisles and listening very attentively when the children came to the chorus where the waving of the flag comes in. Immediately, without warning or signal, the whole room appeared as one mass of waving flags, which combined with the sweet voices of the children made a sight pleasing to both eye and ear. The flags had been secreted under the desks by the children until the proper moment and their presence was not even suspected. Mr. Ross was immensely tickled and expressed himself as highly pleased with the scene."

The sum of \$500 was set apart for the demonstration.

It was decided to lay apart \$150 for cleaning school furnaces.

Then the matter of janitors' salaries came up. The general impression of the committee was that too much money was spent on the janitorship of the high school and not enough on that of some of the other schools. However, the sum of \$600 will probably be continued to be paid toward the former.

A communication from Engineer Graydon re a proposed change in the tower of the new addition to the Collegiate Institute, to cost \$150, was referred to Principal Merchant and Chairman Blackwell to report.

Trustees D. W. Blackwell (in the chair), Martin, Anderson and Dewar, Principal Merchant, Secretary McElhann and Inspector Perry were present.

Some More Factories.

In the House of Commons the other evening Mr. Foster gave some particulars about the industrial establishments of Scotland and Port Elgin. In Seaforth these establishments included two bakeries, six boot and shoe stores, one carpenter, fifteen dressmaking establishments, three fancy goods stores, two photographers, three tin shops and five tailor shops. Port Elgin's industries included five boot and shoe stores, two bakers, one carpenter, ten dressmakers' establishments, two photographers, three tailors' stores and two watchmakers. In many of these industries the employees numbered one man, and he the boss.
