The first intimation of the disaster

was the arrival of a fishing boat at Yarmouth with six bodies which she had picked up in the vicinity of the spot where the Cobra was last seen. According to the fishermen, the Cobra was sighten by the lightship off Dowsing Sands, yesterday morning, enveloped in steam, and soon afterward she disappeared. The men on the lightship supposed the Cobra had sailed away, until the evening when they observed bodies floating in

the water, and signaled to the fish-

ing boat to investigate the disaster.
