PEARY'S LETTER

Arctic Explorer Writes New York Friend of His Experiences in the Far North.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 19.-Chas. A. Moore, of New York, has received a most interesting letter from Lieut. Richard F. Peary, the Arctic explorer. Mr. Moore, who was an intimate friend of the late President McKinley, and went with him on his trip to the Pacific slope, was in Washington to be present at the funeral ceremonies.

Lieut. Peary's letter, dated Aug. 20, was handed to Mr. Moore, by H. L. Bridgman, secretary of the Peary Arctic Club of New York, who had brought it direct from Lieut. Peary.

The letter is as follows:

"My Dear Mr. Moore: Both your letters (1900 and 1901) are in my possession. The former, carried on an Eskimo sledge, drawn by twelve dogs, met me on April 30 of this year, as I was tramping along the icefoot near

Hayes Point, about 80 degrees northern latitude.

"The letter was handed me by Mr. Bridgman at Etah on Aug. 4.

"You can imagine how much, with my surroundings, your wanderings interested me. Reading, as I did, clothed in furs and a snow igloo, your story seemed like a fairy tale or a narrative of another world than this.

"On my long sledge trip of a year ago I expended thirteen carbine cartridges with a result of eleven musk oxen and polar bears, and in the fall, hunting at Conger, I bagged twenty musk oxen one day with 25 cartridges.

"I have heard of your trip with Mrs. Moore and the president. I am still Mr. Moore's secretary. I am still hammering away at my object, getting some hard knocks, doing some work that will endure longer than I, yet still short of my goal. But my grip is still good; I have a year before me, and I have yet to experience the first feeling of discouragement.

"R. E. PEARY."

ONLY TWELVE SURVIVORS.

A dispatch from Middleboro says twelve survivors of the crew of the Cobra were landed there this morning, and confirms the first report that all the others were drowned.

The British admiralty has received information that the explosion occurred after the Cobra struck a rock and that she sank immediately.

The Cobra, like her sister boat, The Viper, was a turbine-engined vessel. She had just left the yard of her contractors and was undergoing a boiler test. About one year ago the Cobra beat the record of The Viper and won the title of the fastest vessel in the world, making 37.7 knots or 43.5 miles an hour.

THE ONLY SURVIVORS.

London, Sept. 18.-The Cobra had on board 12 naval men and about 35 men in the employ of the contractors.

So far as known the twelve men previously mentioned to be the only survivors. Five boats were launched after the Cobra struck, but some of them were swamped in heavy seas.

According to the fishermen, the Cobra was sighted by the lightsight off Dowling Sands, yesterday morning, enveloped in steam, and soon afterward she disappeared. The men on the lightsight supposed the Cobra had sailed away, until
