What Do You Pay? Daring Rescue of Two Tots at Yonkers, N. Y.

> They Fell From a Bridge Into a Swoilen lcy Stream.

Yonkers, N. Y., Jan. 8.-A rescue at once thrilling and heroic was performed Saturday afternoon, but became generally known only last evening through the grateful parents of the rescued children. Two little tots, hardly 5 years old, sons of John Whalen and John Selensky, of Garden street, were standing on a bridge watching some men kicking a football in a lot on the banks of Nepperhan Creek. While climbing to gain a better view, both children slipped and fell

into the rushing water, which at this THRILLING AND HEROIC season is very deep and swift.

A cry at once went up and a crowd rushed to the water side, where the two children could be plainly seen struggling in vain as they were borne along by the rapid current.

Four young men dashed into the stream, and one, Michael Connors, of 32 Garden street, managed to reach the children as they were floating by. His companions, who had followed him and formed a line, took the children and passed them to the shore. The task, which was most difficult and dangerous owing to the tremendous force of the icy water, was applauded

by the onlookers.

The men disappeared after the rescubut it was ascertained that Connor's assistants were his cousin, Patrick Conners, of 81 Vineyard avenue, William Connors, of 69 Garden street, and Louis Hopkins, of 88 Garden street. The children had floated nearly 200 yards before they were rescued. Last spring he jumped from the window of a house on the banks of the creek and rescued a child in a heavy freshet. ## A TALK WITH HON. GEO. W. ROSS

What the Premier Told the Man From the Mail-Whitney Has Nothing to Say.

Toronto, Jan. 8 .- Premier Ross was seen by the Mail and Empire at his home last night. He was naturally well satisfied with the results of the bye-elections. The Liberal party regarded it as a splendid victory, he said, and felt that it was the turning point in the fate of the Government. With these three seats he was given a majority of five, and he felt now that he could carry on the Government of the Province without any difficulty, as he believed every supporter of the Government would stand by him in any reasonable legislation he might pro-

The hope was also expressed by the Premier that now, at the end of the campaign, the bitterness and party feeling which characterized it would subside, and that the political plat-form henceforth would be used for the discussion of public questions rather than for casting reflections on political opponents. Ontario deserved the best energies of both parties to secure its highest development, and so far as he, as Premier, was concerned, he hoped to be sufficiently relieved from electoral contests for the remainder of his term and apply himself to the proper functions of a legislator. His advice

now was, let resentment subside and let Ontario prosper.

Mr. Ross added that he wished to express his indeptedi friends who had given their loyal support to his Government, and also to the party workers for their selfsacrifice in placing their time at the disposal of the party during the last three weeks. "And I might say, too," the Premier concluded, "that the house will be stronger because of the talent

## IN DREAD OF DISEASE

There Are Fears That Bubonic Plague

May Reach Arizona. Tucson, Ariz., Jan. 8.-The spread of the bubonic plague towards the United States has caused such great alarm in Arizona that six prominent physicians here sent the following dispatch to the surgeon-general of the marine hospital

service: "Reliable reports from Guayamas indicate that an epidemic of bubonic plague at Topolombampo and Guayamas is extending north. Cargoes from infected ports are unloading daily at Guayamas and other ports with no precautions whatever. The mortality rate is over 50 per cent. and the epidemic is spreading rapidly. It is a great menace to Southen Arizona and should be investigated immediately and quarantine against the infected ports should be established."
