FIRST CAMPAIGN SHOTS FIRED BY THE LEADERS

Premier's Rousing Speech in North York.

Mr. Whitney Starts the Ball Rolling in East Durham.

Premier Exposes the Opposition's Negative Record for 30 Years—Hon. E. J. Davis Renominated.

Newmarket, April 4.—Hon. G. W. Ross fired the first shot of the provincial campaign today at Newmarket. Twelve hundred Liberals, from all parts of the riding, made their way through muddy roads to attend the party convention, at which Hon. E. J. Davis was for the sixth consecutive time chosen, and again unanimously, to contest North York for the legislature.

The premier was accorded an ovation when he came forward to speak. As he reached the front of the platform a little girl presented him with a magnificent bouquet of roses, and the premier cordially acknowledged the compliment. Meanwhile the audience was giving vent to its enthusiasm by a loud outburst of cheers, and a minute or two elapsed before the premier could begin his address. He began by paying a graceful tribute to his colleague, Hon. E. J. Davis, who, he said, was the trustee for all the crown lands of the province, over 100,000 acres. He had an immense heritage, more than the area of Great Britain and Ireland put together. (Applause.) They had decided only about 500,000 acres, while there were in all about 120,000,000 acres. He would need to be an honest man or he would dispose of these crown lands for his own interest.

THE ELECTION SOON.

"We are going to have an election very soon," said the premier. "I shall not tell you the date just today; you will hear that some time later—in time to vote. We have nothing to be ashamed of that we know of. Our record has been before you. Our opponents say we have been in office too long. That is not our fault. (Laughter.) You have kept us there; and you have been just as kind to the opposition as you have been to us—you have kept them there for thirty years." (Laughter.)

THE OPPOSITION RECORD.

He pointed out that if the opposition had had its way during the past 20 years there would have been no distribution of the surplus, no vote by ballot, no School of Practical Science, no separation of the liquor traffic from municipal control, no minister of education, no Normal School, no conscription, no railway subsidies for colonization purposes.

"You can see if all these things were eliminated from the scientific agencies for the improvement of the province how little would be left, and how weak the efforts of the government would be to maintain the standard of the province. We are entering this election with confidence. We have nothing to withdraw in the shape of legislation that has been found useless or ineffective. We have no apology to offer for any measure that we have submitted to the people."

THE PROHIBITION ISSUE.

Speaking of prohibition he said: "I, for one, if called upon, shall not shrink from such discussion. If, on the other hand, it is thought best to defer the pending election on those great questions of public policy which so closely affect the material prosperity of the province outside the question of lot, no party strife has subsided and the public mind is free to be directed to the issues involved in prohibition, let every man turn his attention thoughtfully and seriously to the responsibility of casting his ballot on Dec. 4, as he may be directed by his judgment and his conscience in such a weighty matter, for as Whitney puts it, 'The kindest act of freedom is the freeman's vote.'"

As the premier resumed his seat the

audience rose in a body and gave three hearty cheers in his honor.

Whitney Opens Campaign.

Port Hope, April 4.—Mr. J. P. Whitney, K.C., and his lieutenant, J. J. Foy, K.C., opened their provincial campaign here tonight, before the electors of East Durham.

Mr. Whitney claimed that the policy enunciated by the premier, on cold storage, dressed beef, good roads, and drainage had completely collapsed. There had been much beating of drums over New Ontario. The members of the government even got angry if it were suggested that anyone had a knowledge of or a regard for New Ontario, but did not his hearers think it was time to speak a little about Old Ontario? Mr. Whitney attacked Mr. Ross' prohibition record, and said Mr. Ross had not shown himself a straightforward, bold man on this question. If he were that, he would never have endeavored to shield himself under the wretched, contemptible subterfuge of the referendum, a measure which had no more place in any country enjoying British institutions than the whip of the slavey Miss Mistrude Gillespie; and he denounced the pulp concession, and promised, if returned to power to put the finances of the province on a proper footing, to establish five or six agricultural schools, and to endeavor to remedy the unjust discrimination in the matter of freight rates, whereby \$600,000 was taken from farmers' pockets. He also promised to make the public schools self-centered.

Mr. Hepburn was one of Stratford's oldest Scotchmen, and one of the oldest Masons in the city, and was well respected.

Failures in Canada.

[Dun's Review, April 5.]

Insolvencies in the Dominion of Canada numbered 363, against 424 in 1901, while liabilities were \$3,433,992, compared with \$3,333,722 last year. There was considerable increase in defaults in the Province of Ontario, but a still larger decrease in Quebec. In number there was little change in British Columbia, but the losses were heavier. Only small changes were recorded in the other provinces. The one financial failure reported was in Ontario of a capitalist, and not of a banking institution.

AN ELECTRIC HEADLIGHT.

An electric headlight which throws a vertical as well as a horizontal beam of light is being tried on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway. A steam turbine has its shaft connected directly to that of a dynamo, furnishing a current for the arc lamps in the headlight. The engine and dynamo run at about 2,000 revolutions a minute, and may be placed directly behind the lantern or in any other convenient position on the engine. A deflector in front of the upper part of the glass projects about 40 per cent of the light in a vertical beam. To prevent the horizontal beam from dazzling the eyes of the engineers on double track, a semi-transparent curtain, on a spring roller is fitted to the front of the lantern, being operated from the cab. When the engine equipped with the electric light is approaching a train on the other track this curtain is unrolled so as to reduce the intense brilliancy of the light.
